Brief history: In the Southeast Region we have for many years recognized that the Richmond, Virginia area was an ideal area for a Campvention. With the proximity of our Nation's Capital, all of the Revolutionary and Civil War history, Williamsburg, Yorktown and Jamestown, there is something for everyone here.

In 1998 The Southeast Region chose The Agra-Center at Perry, Georgia mainly because it was the only venue we had that could handle the expected number of campers. In 2005 we looked at the Virginia State Fairground, but it was becoming a NASCAR facility and just wasn't suitable for our needs. There wasn't anything else in the area that would work for us so we looked to North Carolina and West Virginia. The Dixie Fairgrounds at Winston Salem was having growing pains, and we couldn't come to terms; so we looked to The West Virginia State Fairgrounds in Lewisburg, WV. We were larger than any RV Rally they had hosted, but their staff was ready to meet any challenges, and there was whitewater rafting, the big ear in Greenbank, Cass Scenic Railroad, The Greenbriar Resort, so many things to see and do.

In 2011 there still wasn't a suitable venue around Richmond so we chose Ladson, SC, close to Historic Charleston and close to many beaches.

Fast forward to 2018, Virginia Farm Bureau purchased The Meadow Farm and is an outstanding facility, located on 313 acres. It is just off I-95, 14 miles north of Richmond, VA, exit 98. At the same exit is King's Dominion, one of Virginia's premier Amusement Parks.

The Meadow Event Park is on the left side of State Route 30 less than 3 miles from the interstate. We will be using the 60,000 sq. ft. Farm Bureau building, The Meadow Hall, which was the family mansion, and the Meadow Pavilion that is a 6400 sq. ft. facility that we will use as our Youth and Teen center. On the right side of Rt. 30 is the equestrian center. One of the best surprises was finding that the Operations VP is the same person we worked with in 2005 at Lewisburg. She is dedicated to making the Park the best it can be and making sure that visitors to the park enjoy their stay.

Come early; Camping is available on the 7th & 8th, and the local Commerce chamber will have an information booth set up to give you all the tourism information. For those who would like to come to the area earlier or to stay in the area after Campvention, there are local campgrounds nearby.

Most of our campsites will be on the Festival Grounds directly in front of the Farm Bureau Building with the rest along the side of the building. All campers will have 50 AMP electric and water; most sites will have sewer and any that don't will get a free dump from the honey wagon.

RV problems? Wayne's RV Repair will be ongrounds to solve all your minor repairs. Karen's Embroidery will be on hand for your FCRV clothing and accessories. The Two Kings Caters will have their snack bar open for Breakfast, Lunch and Supper as well as ice cream. There will be competition in Horse Shoes, Ladder Golf and Corn Hole. The adult center will be open for board and card games. The Teen's Kings & Queens will enjoy their Tea in the Mansion; Red Hat Breakfast will also be in the Mansion.

Ron Braley is working on activities for the new Veterans program. One activity will be a seminar on the proper way to retire our American Flag.

Saturday and Sunday are exploring days; enjoy touring the area. You can even catch a train in Richmond that will take you to Washington DC. Wil-

liamsburg, Yorktown and Jamestown are an easy day trip from The Meadow Event Park.

We will have non-domination Church service at 6:00 pm on Sunday; Campvention Opening Ceremonies at 7:00 pm, followed by a welcoming Hospitality hosted by the Southeast Region.

Come early, tour this fantastic area, and join your FCRV friends and Family at the 2018 Campvention at the Meadow Event Park in Doswell, Virginia.



Learn to Love the Wet Spots

Wetlands are protected. True fact: in many areas, we are destroying the eco-systems Mother Nature has put in place just for us. Consider this simple fact: how many of us enjoy eating seafood? If our wetlands are drying up and destroyed, then our food supply has been impacted, and once it is lost, getting it back can be extremely difficult, if not impossible.

Have you noticed that a part of your yard is constantly wet? Take a few minutes and explore where the water is coming from. In many cases, this is nature's way of maintaining our water supply. A swamp, or soggy earth, has a great value. What lives in this water, how long will it be around, and what feeds this standing body of water? Each one of us can learn to live with or near this wetland area. Swamps, for example, live a health existence without man's intervention. When it rains, the wetland area may flood for a time, and then evaporate with the heat of the summer months, only to return once again. The water level will rise with rain, and fall over time; this is the natural process. Something to consider: wonder what happens to some of the wetlands and swamps around your community? Look carefully; who destroyed them? Whether one realizes it or not, each and every time a new housing development or shopping center breaks ground some of our natural wetlands get filled in with dirt. Then ask yourself, why do some areas around this development flood each and every time it rains? Well, guess what, the developer destroyed the natural wetlands and the resource area for the rain water.

You are invited to come to the Conservation Workshop on Wetlands. At this wonderful seminar you will learn if you live close to or around wetlands, by using various resources everyone present will learn that if it's vegetable gardening and/or flower garden we want to take precautions to protect the surrounding water resources. With this information, one will have a lot of gardening choices to make as you proceed.

To find out more about the importance of our Wetlands, come to the Conservation Workshop. (Check the Campvention Schedule for date and time.) This workshop, under the direction of the Master Gardeners which is a part of the United States Department of Agriculture, Co-operative Extension Office of Stafford County Virginia, will present the importance of saving and preserving our wetlands.

Family Campers & RVers Turns 69 in July

FCRV INTERNATIONAL CAMPING CLUB

North America's oldest non-profit family camping organization will mark its founding 69 years ago on July 4^{th,} 2018. A New York

businessman named Hank Nathan shared his campfire with some other campers at Bushkill Falls, NY. The group camped together again and invited other families and by 1956 had grown into a national organization called the National Campers & Hikers Association. They helped people learn about camping

equipment, locate good campsites, and set up activities.

The organization's growth followed the RV boom and in the early 1970's NCHA had more than 77,000 families in the U.S. and Canada. The group became known not only for fun and friendship, but also for conservation projects in their

home areas. With its legislative watch it was also known as an advocate for campers' rights. NCHA / FCRV has raised thousands of dollars for Ronald McDonald Houses by recycling aluminum cans and pull tabs. They have also awarded more than \$250,000 in scholarships and many thousands of dollars for wild-life grants. Other programs developed over the years to benefit members include travalongs, disaster awareness training, hiking, campground and other discounts, youth, teen, and retiree programs.

The two biggest events of the year are the National Campvention or rally in July and the winter Retiree Rally in the sun belt. The 2018 Campvention is in Doswell, Virginia at Meadow Event Park July 9 - 13 and

the winter Retiree Rally is in Tallahassee, Florida at the North Florida Fairgrounds March 20 – 25. The 2019 Campvention is in Hutchison, Kansas mid july and the Retiree 2019 Retiree Rally is in Houma, Louisiana at Terrebone Civic Center. Campvention locations are on a rotation between 8 regions of membership in the U.S. and Canada. The July 2020 Campventioin is in Ontario and the March Retiree Rally is in Dothan,

AL. The Regional and State / Provincial FCRV Directors find a site with facilities big enough for 300 - 400 RVs and submit a bid to the Board of Trustees for approval.

There are local chapters all over the U. S. and Canada and they sponsor low cost local, state / provincial, and regional campouts. A calendar of events is published in Camping Today online and on the FCRV website at www.fcrv.org.

KOA: Tech Can Detract from Camping Experience

Campground owners need to be willing to embrace technology at their campgrounds, but how campers use that technology while camping may be shifting, according to the 2018 North American

Camping Report commissioned by Billings, Montabased Kampgrounds of America Inc. (KOA).

The report indicates that 93% of campers bring some form of mobile device with them on camping trips, while one-fourth of all campers "say it is important to them to share their experiences on social media."

Wi-Fi is also becoming an "expected amenity," according to the report. "Four-in-10 camper households overall say access to cell service or Wi-Fi




impacts the amount they camp."

But tides are shifting on how important technology is to the overall camping experience, KOA President Toby O'Rourke told *Woodall's Campground Management (WCM)*, sister publication to *RVBusiness*. In 2017, over half of Millennials (52%) said that technology distracts from their overall enjoyment of camping, up from 38% in 2016.

"We're seeing more and more people saying technology is a distraction from their overall enjoyment while camping, but they are still bringing their technology while camping and they're using it as they need it," O'Rourke said. "These devices are becoming more of a utility it seems. You don't do anything without your phone.

But, it's not like they're going camping and sitting there and using that phone as entertainment while they're camping," she continued. "They are camping and enjoying the outdoors, enjoying their time engaging with friends and family, and that's the experience. I think people are so connected all the time that we are seeing people get outside and want to just be outside."

IMPACT OF TECHNOLOGY ON ENJOYMENT OF CAMPING EXPERIENCES



She added that it is still important to have the right infrastructure in place for when campers do want to use their phones. "Access to technology brings information to a prospective camper's fingertips," stated the report. "Answers to their questions are as close as a Google search and help, should they need it, is often just a call away. Easy access to technology, and especially mobile devices, also puts their minds at ease regarding safety, allowing them to more fully enjoy their outdoor experience."

The report goes on to say that "unplugged" while camping rarely means that campers are completely disconnecting from technology. Only 1-in-10 say that unplugging means no access to any technology.

"When asked how they 'unplug' while camping, about a third of all campers say that they have their smartphone with them, but they don't turn it on," the report says.



This is by far my favorite dessert recipe in this collection, perhaps even of all time. Fruit-based desserts are my weakness, and there is something amazing about all the flavors melting together in this cobbler. The peaches are

just lightly sweetened and the cake topping is fluffy with a hint of tea and cardamom. My personal tea preference for this recipe is Earl Grey, but feel free to use your own favorite tea.

Dutch Oven N Prep Time: 20 minutes Cook Time: 45 minutes Serves 8

FILLING

3 pounds fresh peaches, peeled and cut into thin slices

6 ounces blueberries

1/4 cup granulated sugar

2 tablespoons lemon juice

2 tablespoons cornstarch

TOPPING

3/4 cup all-purpose flour

1/4 cup granulated sugar

1 teaspoon baking powder

1/4 teaspoon kosher salt

1/2 teaspoon cardamom

1 teaspoon finely crushed tea leaves,

like Earl Grey

¼ cup extra virgin olive oil

1/2 cup heavy cream

1/4 cup almond slices

- 1. In a chimney, light up 24 briquettes.
- Combine the peaches, blueberries, ¼ cup sugar, lemon juice, and cornstarch in a large bowl until coated evenly.
- 3. Pour into a 10-inch Dutch oven, scraping in all of the liquid as well.
- In the same mixing bowl, whisk together flour, ¼ cup sugar, baking powder, salt, cardamom, and tea leaves.
- Stir in the olive oil until just incorporated. Mix in the heavy cream until combined.
- Using a spoon, dollop and spread the dough evenly over the peaches. Sprinkle the almond slices over the dough.
- Cover the Dutch oven and add 15 coals on top and 9 briquettes underneath.
- 8. Cook for 45 minutes or until the cobbler is golden brown.

HOME KITCHEN METHOD: To bake at home, assemble the cobbler in an oven-safe dish. Bake in the oven at 375°F for 45 minutes or until the cobbler is golden.

PROPANE CYLINDER REGULATIONS

Regulations recently put in place require that removable propane cylinders in RVs over 10 years old must be checked and recertified by an approved or specially licensed propane dealer before they can be refilled. Not all propane dispensers are licensed to do this. If the tank passes, it gets a sticker good for 5 more years. If your tank fails or you cannot find a convenient recertifier, you will need to buy a new tank. Permanent ASME tanks in motorhomes do not need to be recertified.

ANT KILLER

To get rid of ants mix 32 oz. of water with 1/8 cup of borax and 1 cup of sugar. Soak cotton balls in the mixture and leave out for ants. They will flock to it and take it back to the nest.

MOOCHDOCKING

Moochdocking is much like Boondocking (camping for free in a parking lot, shopping center, truck stop, rest area, etc. Moochdocking is when you visit family or friends and camp in their driveway or yard. Of course they are expected to provide you with water and electric and probably feed and entertain you. However it can work in reverse and you have to do the entertaining, cooking, and even odd jobs.

Yes, cleaning and draining the tanks will still be a "dirty Job" but it will be a little easier to do

Tip of the day..... this one is all math and electricity.... RV's get their juice by a 20Amp or 30AMP--120 volt plug connected to respective circuit breakers or on higher end 5th wheels and MHs, they have a 50AMP - - - 240 volt plug. The 50 Amp plug has 2 hot wires, each connected to 50 amp circuit breakers and a common wire and a ground wire. So if you are connected to a 20A plug, similar to a plug in your house, you are very limited to what you can turn on, before blowing a circuit.... the A/C and coffee pot, but NOT the microwave. I'll explain in a minute. A 30A plug can support (1) A/C.. the coffee pot and microwave, but not the toaster.

Here's the math, watts divided by volts equals Amps. Your 1600 watt hair dryer diveded by 120 volts equals 13.3 Amps. (and more like at CG's, 110 volts, so 14.5 amps.)

So each leg of the voltage coming into the RV is 120 V, regardless of whether it is 20A, 30A or 50A. As I said before, your RV with a 50A plug has 2 - 120 V, 50A legs. In the chart you will see amps by appliance, turn on or off as needed not to exceed your Amperage rating.

This one is going to bring out people and comments from everyone. Take care of your RV, wash and wax it at least 3 times a year. Be careful on the roof, safety first, and wash with Spic and Span or Dicor roof cleaning solution with a soft brush and rinse well. Treat the roof with a Dicor sealant, much like skim milk, apply with a long handle sponge and let dry.

Wash the outside of your RV with a good car wash and HOT water, a soft brush, and a large sponge. For those black streaks from the roof and on the sides of your slide outs from the seals, I use Awsome, from the Dollar Store. Spray from the bottom up, scrub a little with the sponge and rinse. If you leave the Awesome on to long it will streak, just start over from the bottom and all the streaks and blacks streaks will be gone. Wax with a good paste wax like Maguire's at least 2-3 times per year. The liquid cleaner wax is great after you have a good coat on the surface.

Don't forget the tires, the sun does a number on them, so clean and coat them with 303 Conditioner (auto parts store... not cheap).

Your RV will maintain its new like appearance for a long time.

Tip of the day..... As we camp all year long, we like to have the ability to leave our outside door open. I added 3 pieces of 1/16 plexiglass to our screen door. I removed the bottom screen and silicone seal glued the bottom panel in place. The same is done with the middle piece beside the sliding panel.

The top piece is cut top the outside dimensions of the door and white Velcro is used to hold it in place. I left the screen in the top section. The top panel is easily removed for air circulation and stored behind one of the kitchen chairs.

We can leave the outside door open when we are using the heater or air conditioning enjoying the natural light.

I purchased the plexiglass from a Home store and cut it with a very fine pitch plywood blade. I added masking tape to where the cut lines were to prevent chipping.

Volkswagen said it does not currently have production plans for a U.S. pickup but "is keen to gauge the reactions of buyers and media, since pickup trucks are one of the biggest volume segments in the U.S." The vehicle could compete with pickups like the Honda Ridgeline, executives said.

"We want to be a relevant player in this market. We want to definitely be a full-line automaker," said Hinrich Woebcken, chief executive of the North American region for the VW, told reporters Tuesday in New York. "We want to be more American."

Pickups accounted for about 16% of U.S. auto sales in 2017 and the best-selling vehicle is Ford Motor Co's F-Series pickup trucks.




