

OOPS Members Dean Culver and Brian Francis were chosen in the Donkey Derby Race lottery to participate in the 82nd Annual Derby.




ROCKY TOPPERS—AUGUST 2013 CAMPOUT










OVER THE HILL GANG SEPTEMBER CAMPOUT

How To Store Water For An Emergency

What would you do if your water supply became contaminated? Natural disasters can interrupt the flow of clean water. Following a disaster, some people may not have access to food and water for days or weeks. You can live for days without food; but you must have clean, potable water, or you will dehydrate. Whenever there is a crisis, water is the first thing to go.

How Much Water Do I Need To Store?

Each person in your family will need a 72-hour emergency supply of water: one gallon per person per day for drinking, plus an additional three gallons per person for washing, cooking, sponge bathing, doing the laundry, cleaning dishes, etc.

I recommend a three-month supply of water if possible: 90 gallons per person for drinking and 90 gallons for other uses. Children, nursing mothers and sick people may need more. Store a little extra for them. What Kind Of Containers Are The Best For Storing Water?

Plastic: Soda, water or juice bottles are all good. I save every heavy plastic jug that comes into my house. I fill them with water and store them in my basement and garage. Make sure all plastic containers used for water storage are food-grade, with a high-quality polyethylene terephthalate (PET) rating, and that they have never held chemicals or poisons. Clean all containers thoroughly.

Milk jugs: Milk jugs are not good containers to store water in. After about six months, they start to biodegrade, collapse and leak. Even the 1-gallon blue containers that you can fill up at grocery stores don't last for very long. They are not heavy-duty enough. You will have a big mess. Bleach bottles: Plastic bleach bottles can be used by filling the bleach bottle with water and sealing it with a tight-fitting lid. Do not drink the water stored in bleach bottles. You can use the water for cleaning or washing hands. Label it with a black marker.

Bottled water: Bottled water can be purchased in grocery stores. Cases of bottled water can be stacked.

Tap water: Tap water that comes from a municipal water system contains enough chlorine to be safe for long-term water storage. Just fill your containers with tap water and store them away from sunlight, preferably in a cool, dark place like a basement or garage.

Polyethylene barrels: Commercial water storage barrels are available, and they come in several sizes. There are smaller water containers that hold five gallons of water. They weigh about 40 pounds and have a spigot. These are nice because they can be moved more easily than 55-gallon drums.

Glass containers: Water can be stored in pint-sized or quart-sized jars sealed by the water bath canning method. Fill the jars with water leaving a headspace of about one inch. Tighten the lid and ring onto the jar. Boil the jars in the water bath or use a steamer canner. Store the jars with cardboard in between so they don't break. Pint jars require 20 minutes boiling time and quart jars require 25 minutes.

250-gallon storage tanker: I own one of these water tanks. I really like it because it takes up less space than a 55-gallon drum. This 250-gallon or 185-gallon water tank is shaped to easily fit through doors or set on the floor of your garage. With two locations for spigots and being set up to be gravity fed, there is no need to worry about pumps. The larger tank is equipped for 250 days' of water storage for one person (based on one gallon per person per day) or 125 days for two people and 62.5 days for four people. These water tanks are manufactured in and shipped from Litah

Where Can I Store My Emergency Water Supply?

Store your water supply in a location where you can get to it easily. I like to store most of my water in smaller containers, because it's much easier to carry around.

What if I didn't Store Water For An Emergency

What Do I Do After An Emergency?

In an emergency situation, immediately shut off the water supply to your home. It's a good idea to locate the shut-off valve before you need it and teach everyone in the family to do it immediately after a disaster. The main gas valve must be shut off also. You can drain the pipes and collect the water that is left in your water lines. Just turn on the faucet that is located in the highest room of the house to let air into the lines. Draw the water from the lowest faucet of the house.

What Are Some Other Supplemental Sources Of Water?

- The water in the hot water heater is available for use. Be sure to shut off the incoming water or intake valve to prevent the contaminated water from mixing with the safe water. To take water out of the tank, open the drain valve. A hose can be attached to this valve and the water drained into containers.
- The water in the tank of the toilet (not the bowl) can be scooped out and used if needed.
- Other liquids for drinking can be obtained from canned fruits, juices, vegetables and soft drinks, or anything that has been water-packed using a canning process.
- Snow can be melted and rainwater can be used, if you have a collection barrel. Be sure to disinfect the water before drinking.
- Swimming pools or spas contain treated water. Lakes, streams, ponds, rivers and ditches contain water that can be used if it is clarified and treated. To clarify, strain the water through a cloth placed over a bowl or pot. This will take out impurities. Boiling it vigorously for five minutes will kill all bacteria.

Boiling method: The safest method of purifying water is to boil it vigorously for five minutes. Do not use cloudy water if you have a choice between clear or cloudy. Cloudy water is caused by bacterial growth. Cloudy water must be strained through a cloth to remove the particles. Then boil or treat the water with chemicals.

Colorado's best colors

Autumn in the Colorado Rockies is pure magic. Unfortunately, it only lasts about 20 seconds each year. So don't cheat yourself - set aside a late September weekend for a walk under the Aspen leaves. You won't regret it

Crested Butte - Dark Canyon Trail

Colorado is home to a leviathan. The interconnected roots of the Kebler Pass aspen grove form the largest grove in Colorado and one of the largest living things on planet Earth. And in late September, the whole arborous monster molts in spectacular fashion.

The grove is best seen from the Kebler Pass Road (Gunnison County Road 12), a mostly gravel route that connects Crested Butte to nearby Paonia. But to get in the guts of the beast, locals recommend the moderate 11-mile Dark Canyon Trail - a one-way hike that can be done as a day hike with a shuttled cars or as a superb out-and-back overnight. Getting there: Take Kebler Pass Road almost 12 miles out of Crested Butte to Horse Ranch State Park. Dark Canyon Trail stretches 11 miles from here to Erickson Springs Campground. Overnight camping at Erickson Springs costs \$14 per site.

Steamboat - Three Island Lake Trail

Okay, so Steamboat Springs doesn't have the biggest aspen grove in Colorado. The ski town is still famous for its aspens, which have made it one of the state's best shoulder season destinations. Aspens cover the resort's, slopes, which stay open to downhill mountain biking until Sept. 29. For the infirm, locals suggest Buffalo Pass - an eight-mile drive up a dirt road to the Continental Divide. The out-and-back trip takes about two hours, and offers stunning views from the road. The able-bodied should take a trip into the Mt. Zirkel Wilderness for the stunning 6.1-mile Three Island Lake Trail.

Getting there: Take Highway 40 west from Steamboat Springs to County Road 129, and take this north for 20 miles. Turn right on Seedhouse Road, and take this for nine miles, pass Seedhouse Campground, and turn right on Forest Service road 443. Take this three miles to the trailhead. RMNP - Cub Lake Trail

We are always in support of a visit to Rocky Mountain National Park. But if you're only going to visit Rocky once in the next year, we suggest you do so in the next four to six weeks. Not only are the Park's aspen and willows showing their colors, but the annual elk rut is nearing its peak (stay tuned for a piece on that soon).

The classic autumn hike in the park has always been the 2.5-mile trail to Cub Lake. Much of the landscape around Cub Lake has been blackened, but enough life remains to make a powerful statement about nature's tenacity.

Getting there: The hike is in the eastern end of the park. From the Moraine Park Campground, take a left and drive 1.2 miles to the Cub Lake Trailhead. From Cub Lake, either double back down the 2.5 mile trail or continue 3.5 miles through more aspen groves to the Fern Lake Trailhead

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (CN) - The National Forest Recreation Association and campground management companies sued Uncle Sam, claiming the government shutdown has closed the campgrounds they run even though they do not receive federal funding. The National Forest Recreation Association and co-plaintiffs American Land & Leisure, Recreation Resource Management, and CLM Services sued the U.S. Forest Service in Federal Court. They note acerbically that the shutdown of the federal government has cost their employees hundreds of jobs, and that "Congress has stated no intention to vote to restore campground concessioners' 'back pay.'" They claim the Forest Service is "nonsensically asserting that, while recreating and camping in undeveloped areas is fine. recreating and camping in developed campgrounds and recreation areas run by trained, private concessioners who do not receive any federal funds creates a risk to property, public health and safety because the Forest Service has reduced funds." The companies say they do not get federal funding: "In fact, plaintiffs pay money to the federal government to operate." The Forest Service this month decided to close certain areas in the National Forest System and suspend all concessionaire operations at developed campground and recreation sites nationwide. The plaintiffs are concessionaires at the sites, operating campgrounds in National Forests across the country. They say their services are crucial for the safety of campers, providing emergency first aid, restrooms and clean drinking water on federal campgrounds. They also repair parking lot potholes, fire hydrants and roads. Since the shutdown of the federal government has closed campgrounds in federal forests, campers have been forced onto undeveloped areas, despite the companies' autonomy from the federal

"Having people camp at developed campgrounds or recreate in developed areas operated by concessioners reduces the risks to public safety and resource damage," the groups say. They claim that "the reduction in Forest Service funding has absolutely no impact on the ability of concessioners to continue to ensure public safety and reduce risk of property damage." That's not the only reason the campground managers want Uncle Sam to reopen campgrounds. "In addition to the harm to the public safety and risk of damage to property and resources, the decision to close privately funded campground concession operations has resulted in the loss of hundreds of jobs and revenues that will never be recovered. Congress has stated no intention to vote to restore campground concessioners' 'back pay," states the complaint. The groups say the decision to shut down the campgrounds was nonsensical and unreasonable. They want a declaration that the campground shutdown is an abuse of discretion and contrary to law. They want their camps immediately reopened, and attorneys' fees. They are represented by Kevin Garden.

JoAnn's Cookie Recipes



Angel Drops

2 egg whites ½ tsp. vanilla
Dash of salt

(Beat above contents until frothy)

½ cup sugar

(Gradually add sugar to whites - beat until stiff)

1 cup nuts and 1 cup of butter scotch morsels
(Gently fold into above mixture)

Preheat oven 350° Drop by tsp. on greased cookie sheet (cookies don't spread so cookie will be size of drop) place in oven & turn oven off! Don't open oven for 4 or 5 hrs. You could even leave in oven overnight.

Sugar Cookies

1 cup butter 1 cup sugar 3 eggs 1 tsp. vanilla

1 tsp. nutmeg 2 tsp. cream of tartar

1 tsp. soda 3 cups flour

Cream butter and sugar well. Add eggs and beat until light and fluffy. Add flavorings and dry ingredients. Gradually add flour and mix thoroughly. Divide into 4 or 5 sections. Chill overnight.

Roll thin and cut with cookie cutters. Place on ungreased cookie sheet and bake at 350° for about 8 minutes.


CHAPTER OFFICERS WORKSHOP & PLANNING MEETING


