The 46th Family Campers & RVers Retiree Rally committee is ready to welcome you to The Civic Center, Canton, Texas! We hope you have this rally in your plans!

The Rally officially starts Tuesday, March 21st. The gates will open for Early Bird parking on Friday, March 17th at 8:00 AM. The Early Bird fee is \$20 a day for water, electric, and sewer. The sites will have water, electric, and sewer. It is suggested that we bring extra hose & electric cord, just in case you need it.

Upon your arrival, enter the Rally site with no tow vehicle in tow. (If you do enter the area with the towed vehicle, you will be asked to pull into an area to unhook.) Present you confirmation letter (if you are pre-registered) when you enter the Registration area. You will be directed to the Parking staff who will park you. Please DO NOT leave your rig until they have marked you confirmation letter with your area, row, and site number on your rig on your confirmation letter.

We welcome those who aren't pre-registered. The registration procedure will be completed when you arrive.

When you arrive, you will be given a Welcome Bag from the Canton Visitors Center with info on things to do during your early days. In addition, you will be given rally info to prepare you for Central Registration which will be open on Sunday, March 19^{th} at 12 noon – 5 PM. At 7 PM on Sunday Retiree Chaplain Harold Braley will have a devotional service. For staff members (chairs, co-chairs, workers), the Turners will have a meeting with you following the service. The building will be open for visiting and games.

If you have mail sent to you during the rally, the address to use is – Your Name, FCRV Retiree Rally, Canton Civic Center, PO Box 665, Canton, TX 75103.

When you complete your registration at Central Registration, among other things, you fill out a Parade card. This is important to determine the seating for the opening ceremonies/parade on Tuesday night. For instance, you may have a Texas address but want to parade with Pennsylvania. The indication on your card will make sure you have a seat with Pennsylvania.

Parade format will be Missouri first (King & Queen Dal & Barb Dodson's state), Texas as the host state, states/provinces of the 2017 King & Queen candidates in the order that their applications were received, states/provinces, national chapters, with the Red Hat ladies being the final group. The Milwaukee Road /Berkshire Hathaway/Amtrak/Chicago & Northwestern through Wisconsin

For those campers coming from the northwest heading for Campvention in Lima, Ohio in 2017, you may find yourself traveling along just one of the above mentioned railroads. The Chicago Milwaukee St Paul and Pacific, otherwise known as the Milwaukee Road Railroad, would bring you all the way from Washington. Even though it is no longer on the rails, the road beds are still found and can be followed across Wisconsin.

The Burlington Northern/Santa Fe is another line you might want to follow because of the beautiful scenery that can be found while following it. As you travel down alongside the tracks, you will hear the rumble of engines echo down the Mississippi River Valley, on their way south. It is one route that will lead you to your destination traveling to National Campvention. You will see the name on the engines, but the BNSF was bought out in 2009 by Warren Buffet and the Berkshire Hathaway Railroad line.

Amtrak also crosses Wisconsin and routes south using the best route available to reach their many depots in our state. The C&NW ran between Chicago and Duluth/Superior slicing through on an angle to Chicago.

I hope to give you some ideas on campgrounds and attractions as you follow one of these road beds on your way to National Campvention in Lima, Ohio. You may even want to follow it backwards after leaving, for a change of scenery.

If you are traveling east from North Dakota or coming down from Alberta you may come across one of the many "Oil trains" heading east bound. Should you decide to follow a long, you will come into Wisconsin and follow the Mississippi River south.

Enjoy the trip down Hwy 35 along the mighty Mississippi. A stop in La Crosse to tour the many sights should be on your list of things to do. You could stay south of town at Goose Island County Park, right on the Mississippi River. This is a real nice campground. You can pick up literature in the office with all the interesting sites and tours to check

out while you're in town. But, the main attraction, Grandad Bluff will get you started. The 600-ft high bluff overlooks the city of La Crosse and the Mississippi River Valley which includes the states of Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Iowa. (3020 Grandad Bluff Rd, La Crosse, WI)

You may decide to travel farther south and stay at Blackhawk Island, an Army



Corp of Engineers Park. It is located on a forested bend of the main channel of the Mississippi River. The campground is the largest public use facility in Mississippi's Pool 9. If you have the senior passport in your pocket, it runs \$12.00/night with elec-

tric. Water is available should you need to fill your tank. La Crosse is a key point in your trip because of the Y in the track. Continue south along the Mississippi or start across country to Lake Michigan.

Should you stay on the mighty Mississippi River, pull into one of the parking lots at one of the Locks and watch a barge go up or down the river thru it. It is really something to see those heavy barges lifted up with the water so it can move through another segment of the river.

Continuing south on Hwy 35 you will come to Prairie du Chien and Wyalsuing State Park overlooking the joining of the Wisconsin River and the Mississippi. Even though it is not that far, a stay may be in order. One of the interesting attractions is Villa Louis Estate. (521 N Villa Louis Rd, Prairie du



Chien, WI 53821) The estate is one of Wisconsin's most prosperous 19th century families.

Another ride south of town to Nelson Dewey's Stonefield Village in Cassville is an insight to early Wisconsin settlements. (12195 Hwy VV, Cassville, WI 53806-0125) Stonefield is a re-created 19th century agricultural community village.

Should the actions of slots and the green tables interest you, take a ride across the river to Marquette, Iowa and the Isle of Capri Riverboat. Go early and take in one of the best Breakfast Buffets you will have for a while.

Another spot you may want to visit is a little further south at Potosi and visit one of their breweries in town for a taste of wonderful beer. From there south on Hwy 35 to Hwy 81 and head east to Monroe, WI and join us at the Green County Fairgrounds for the Blues and Balloon Festival. It will be featuring top Blues artists and Hot Air Balloons from around the greater southern Wisconsin area. And for the best in Wisconsin Cheese's, a stop into the Swiss Colony outlet store will be just great.

Continuing south from Prairie du Chien will get you into the land of Lincoln. A town of interest here is Galena. You may want to stop and check out the flood gates that protect it from flooding. There is also a wonderful gentleman who will entertain you with some Mark Twain stories. Finding antiques will be no problem in the many shops downtown.

You will pass thru many communities as you travel further south, even President Reagan's hometown in Dixon. (810 Hennepin Avenue, Dixon, IL 61021) But, you can end up at Craig and Shari's Campground in Geneseo, Illinois, and check if she has left for National. If not, you could follow her across the state. And, I am sure she will give you some interesting sites to visit, like the John Deere Museum and the Buffalo Bill and American Pickers museum in La Clair, Iowa before you leave Geneseo.

If you decided to cut across the top of her state or visited with us in Monroe, swing on to the Amtrak/ C&NW line and be sure and stop at the Illinois Railway Museum (7000 Olson Rd, Union, IL 60180-9628), largest full-size train museum in the United States. Just south of the museum is a nice Plan a good day to see everything if campground. you are a railroad buff. They even have a locomotive there with a Jet engine that ran up and down California. Rumor is it stopped under a highway overpass and melted the blacktop on the road above causing all kinds of problems. I'm getting away from Wisconsin, so keep heading east, and we will meet up on I-80 south of Chicago.

If you switch lines in La Crosse taking the Milwaukee Road line east, stop at Tunnel Trails Campground and ride your bike on the actual road bed and go thru some of the tunnels the trains would travel. You will be on the Sparta –Elroy State Bike trail on the old road bed. We have a whole network of bike trails across Wisconsin, and they are really beautiful and interesting. If your timing is just right and you hit Tomah at the end of June, take in the National Tractor Pulling Contest but be sure and bring some ear plugs; it gets loud. If you're a retired or active veteran, Camp Douglas/Fort McCoy is right down the road, and they have a campground.

If you want more fun, get on down the road (I-94) to Wisconsin Dells. Wisconsin Dells is being billed the Water Park Capitol of the World. You will want to spend some time at the many water parks and mini -golf courses. It may take a few days; so checkout one of the many campgrounds in and around town, most are all part of WACO (Wisconsin Assoc. of Campground Owners). Mini-golf is great in this town try Pirates Cove.

A few miles south of the Dells is North Freedom, home of another railroad museum, and close by is Baraboo, home of Circus World Museum, which will be closing doors this year. If you are in the Casino mood, there is one in the Dells, too, complete with a RV Park. Oh, did I mention Frank Lloyd Wrights -House on the Rock - in Spring Green south of the Dells? There is camping nearby at Tower Hill State Park.

Now, keeping on that same Amtrak/CMSP&P line will take you through Portage and Columbus which has some antique shops that may interest you. Outside of town is Astigo County Park, a nice little campground for some quiet time. If you like, stay on Hwy 16 till you get to Hwy 89 south out of Columbus and follow it to Fort Atkinson. Then take Hwy 12 south till you come to Hwy 20 and head east, taking you around the construction on I-94 in Milwau-Find a great campsite at Racine's Cliffside kee. County Park, off of I-94 on 7 mile road, than east to Lake Michigan follow the signs. Now you are set in a great park to take in many of the attractions in the area. You can plan on needing a day or two to really take it all in, unless you come back this way. In Milwaukee Summer Fest, which is the biggest Music festival in the States, with headline entertainers will be just starting up. Time it right and get in the first day with non-perishable food for local food pantries or wait a day and avoid the crowd. Go to the Harley Davidson Museum or the terrific Milwaukee Zoo or Miller Brewery and savor the taste of Wisconsin, instead on that first day. If you are lucky, and the Brewers are playing at home, you could take in a baseball game. Another side trip would be to the Civil War Museum in Kenosha. And don't forget to stop and pick up a terrific Racine Kringle at one of the 3 top bakeries in town; if you get two, they do freeze well so you have one for Campvention.

I know now it is getting closer to CV so you will have to plan out how you want to handle the great wall of Chicago. If you have time you can swing west and south and stop at Chain-O Lakes State Park, just over the state line south of Wilmot, WI. You could relax there, maybe go horseback riding on the trails. Or hop up to Antioch and catch the Amtrak train to downtown Chicago. There you could take in the Museum of Science and Industry (best in Midwest). Or visit the World Series Champions Chicago Cubs at historic Wrigley Field, should they be playing at home. Take a cab to the south side if you're a White Sox fan. Stop in at the Blackhawks hockey store while you're walking around downtown for your best souvenir. Ride the train back out and avoid the crowd and traffic.

Now that you're west of town, you have the choice of going a few more miles west then south to get down and around the great wall. Or go for it and take Hwy 173 east to I-94 and head south choosing 94 thru downtown Chicago (watch for Sears Tower) and no tolls or I- 294 toll way bypass around the city. You will meet up with I-80 south of town and take it too I-65 south.

Come over to Lima on Indiana Hwy 30 or Hwy 20 and take in the Amish areas. There is a good campground in Shipshewana on both the north and south side of town off Hwy 20. The big Amish Flea market is on Tuesdays & Wednesdays. You don't want to miss it. The campground is next door.

From there it is only a couple of hours to Lima and the main terminal of Campvention at Registration. Have fun and plan it out for the best timeline to arrive by Sunday at Campvention. If you just don't get enough fun with that trip, turn around and head back up to Wisconsin for Country Thunder in Twin Lakes, Wisconsin. If you want to see what it was like when NCHA had 4 and 5 thousand campers spread out in 5 alfalfa fields, pit toilets, possible mud, lots of fun, dry camping, no electric unless you want, go on line and get your site today. It is a week of C&W music by the best in the industry.

For those of you coming down from Canada and traveling along Lake Michigan out of Ontario at Sault Sainte Marie, stop in to the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame museum. There is a wonderful winery in Two Rivers called Von Steil, and their wine is very good. Manitowoc has a Marine time museum with a WWII Submarine to tour. There are some state parks along the lake to camp at on your way south. You could then do the Summer Fest music event in Milwaukee and camp right in town at State Fair Parks RV campground.

If you feel this is an interesting trip, be sure to make your own reservations at the various campgrounds mentioned in the article. Wisconsin has many interesting sites and loads of festivals during the summer and fall; take advantage and have fun.

It was proposed and approved by the Trustees to change the rotation of the upcoming campventions. The reasoning behind this was (if using the Mississippi River as the central point), we go East 3 times in a row then West twice. Our proposal was to move the 2019 Campvention to Heartland Region and the 2020 Campvention to Canada Region. The regions were contacted and agreed with the change. We are working with both regions to locate facilities to have the campventions. With the change we can hopefully have better attendance and more notice of when and where we are going.

RV One Details Plans for Airstream Ranch Site

The controversial "Airstream Ranch" — a curious row of partially buried Airstream travel trailers created by Frank Bates in 2007 off I-4 near his Bates RV dealership in Tampa, Fla. — is being torn down.

Swinging the wrecking ball is RV One Super-

stores Inc., which purchased Bates RV in 2013 and reopened it as Tampa RV. Founded in 1984, RV One also has locations in Orlando, Fla., Albany and Buffalo, N.Y., and Des Moines, Iowa.



Don Strollo, president and CEO of RV One, said the company has some ambitious plans for a portion of the property where the Airstream Ranch had entertained passersby for a decade. In its place, RV One will build an Airstream museum and Airstream of Central Florida standalone dealership. The 17,000square-foot facility is scheduled to open in December of this year.

In conjunction with construction of the new Airstream facility, the existing Tampa RV dealership adjacent to the site is being entirely reconstructed with an even bigger facility and new grounds. It's scheduled for completion by the end of the year as well.

"The Airstream trailers coming out of the ground do not represent the end of anything for us. It s repre-



sents the beginning of new opportunities and exciting growth for the area, which will be honoring the spirit of Airstream and American travel in a much bigger way. The facility will be a

national destination," said Strollo.

The new Airstream of Central Florida "will stand even taller and more prominent than those old trailers coming out of the ground," he added. The facility will feature a museum dedicated to Airstream's iconic founder, Wally Byam, as well as an interactive display called the "Airstream Experience."

"We are thrilled to be bringing this focused growth to the Tampa area. Hillsborough County has been very professional and welcoming to our plans and great to work with," said Strollo. "The economic and civil planning teams within the county seem to have a positive and proactive outlook for the area. We are glad to be here."

His brother, Matt Strollo, who serves as vice president of business development for the company, said RV One's growth since acquiring the dealership four years ago is evidence of its commitment to the Tampa area. A third brother, Mark Strollo, is the senior vice president and lives in New York.

"I moved from Orlando to Tampa in 2013 for this very purpose," Matt Strollo said. "Our family has a long tradition and history in the RV industry. The corporate outlook on 'consumers as a number' doesn't sit well with us. The personal attention we provide customers rivals that of any of our competitors, and it's proving out. In 2013, Bates RV generated \$13 million in sales at this location. In 2016, we generated just shy of \$100 million here. Personal attention is the key and is something we offer."

Ultimately, the company plans future expansion with a 94-acre parcel next door, which will feature a

third dealership and 300-site luxury RV Resort. The completion of that project will make the site one of the largest RV dealerships in the world, Don Strollo noted, with more square footage under roof and more RVs on display the any other dealer in Florida.

Strollo noted the company's Des Moines location also is undergoing a similar project, adding that the company expects to retail more than 8,000 RVs nationwide in 2017, representing approximately \$400 million in sales.

Reuse Every Day Items

The average person throws away about 4.3 pounds of trash a day. Some of those objects thrown away can be recycled or reused to turn the once garbage object into something really special. Three examples are toilet tissue or paper towel rolls, milk cartons, and any size soda bottle. My name is Tyler Mathews and I am 13 and let's all go into the world of recycling these three house-hold objects.

The first object to be reused is the humble toilet or paper towel roll. Many people throw these little objects away with no second thought but this simple object can be turned into a bird feeder. For all of the bird lovers out there this is the perfect thing to make. To create this wonderful object, you simply take a toilet or paper towel roll and spread peanut butter all over it. Then, roll it in bird seed. TaDa!! We now have a bird feeder that can be placed or hung anywhere.

Secondly, we have the plastic milk jug. The plastic milk jug can be made into several things such as a bird/squirrel feeder and a place for birds to nest. To create the feeder, you need to cut a big hole in the front of the jug. Then, pour some bird seed inside the milk carton. Finally, glue a stick to the front of the jug to make a perch for birds. To make a nest, cut the top of the jug off and hang it up. Eventually, a bird will make a nest in it.

Third, we have the soda bottle. It is a common object that is normally thrown away. The soda bottle can be turned into two things, a bird feeder or a planter. "RV" Ready To Camp?

More and more people are buying RVs, and the number is expected to rise even more in 2017. RVs and family vacations are a match made in heaven, and if you want the perfect home-away-from-home when summer hits, the time to shop is now. Industry experts from RV dealers in Texas have revealed what they're looking forward to most in the RV space this year, and what trends they see for 2017.

Mike Regan, President and General Manager of Crestview RV, has been in the RV business for 15 years. He will be an exhibitor at the 2017 Austin RV Expo in February. Regan said the industry is selling more units than they have in the past 30 or 40 years, and the units are only improving.

"RVs are much more complex today," he said. "They're incorporating more entertainment aspects, like televisions and fireplaces. Trends are changing quickly in the RV industry, just like in the housing industry."

Regan's largest customer base is young couples with kids who are between five and 10 years old. His recommendations depend on how many people they need to sleep, or if they plan to tow a vehicle with them on their camping or beach trip.



"A big screen TV, outside kitchen, king size bed and bunk beds are a few things customers frequently ask for, but it all depends on what the individuals want," Regan said. "For first time buyers, I make recommendations based on their wants and desires, whether they're looking to make a trip to the beach or visit the state parks."

Arnold Simmons, General Manager at RV Outlet Mall, has been in the RV business for 10 years. He will also be exhibiting at the 2017 Austin RV Expo. Simmons is amazed by the innovations that happen each year in the RV space.

"The RV industry innovates and comes up with new ideas each year," Simmons said. "There are constant improvements on the product, like bigger TVs and better sound systems on the outside."

A major trend Simmons is looking forward to is the one-piece step on Cardinal fifth wheels, which takes the place of conventional fold-up steps. The one -piece step is sturdy, doesn't fold, and rises up inside the door to latch to the doorframe. These units are what Simmons is most looking forward to showing at the Austin RV Expo. He is also excited about the leveling feature on RVs.

"Leveling an RV has become an issue, but now there are buttons you can push when you unhook that level your RV for you," Simmons said. "It's surprising how many units have the automatic leveling system. There's usually one on high dollar fifth wheels priced around \$100,000, but now they're even on travel trailers that are priced in the mid 30s."

To Simmons, it seems like all areas are covered when it comes to RV convenience, but manufacturers are coming up with something new all the time.

Regan agrees now is a great time to shop for an RV, and the Austin RV Expo is a good place to see a little bit of everything.

"If you need to make a special order, those usually take six to eight weeks, so come out in February and order something so it's here in time for camping season," Regan said.

Indiana RV Sales Tax Bill Gets Senate Approval

An Indiana bill calling to exempt outof-state RV buyers from having to pay a sales tax passed the Senate on Monday (Feb. 6).

Rep. Robert Cherry, R-Greenfield, and Sen. Blake Doriot, R-Syracuse, proposed two separate bills that would waive Indiana sales tax for all out-of-state RV buys who make a purchase in Indiana. Currently, nine states have to pay an out-of-state tax if they buy an RV in Indiana, but this new bill would remove that.

The measure now heads to the Indiana House for consideration.

Ron Breymier, executive director of the Indiana Manufactured Housing Association-Recreation Vehicle Indiana Council, who helped write both bills, said that when the new sales tax rules were first implemented in 2004 Indiana dealers saw sales plummet and quite a few had to close their businesses.

"Many dealers have told us that this has had a significant impact on their dealership," he said. "Elkhart County used to have 12 or 13 dealerships, but that has fallen to just a couple that were able to survive."


