'All aboard!' The FCRV Campvention 2017 Train will be pulling into the Lima, Ohio railroad depot, aka the Allen County Fairgrounds, on July 9th for a fun-filled week of activities for all ages. The Campvention chairs, co-chairs, and team members have finalized their areas. They anticipate your arrival.

Amenities - 30-amp service with water access. Dump stations are on the grounds. There will also be a honey wagon for a fee. Friday July 7 & Saturday July 8 will be the early days at \$25 per night. Early day arrivals will receive information on self-guided tours of the area as well as activities available in the area (museums, parks, etc.) Camping will be 'hoboby-state/province.' There are two brick showers/restrooms. As added info, you can see Walmart from the grounds!!

Like to eat out! You'll have LOTS of choices. Also be sure to patronize the local hamburger joint – Kewpee Hamburgers. Takes you back. Its founder, Samuel V. Blair, claims to be the first to use the flat bun and developed the 'deluxe' hamburger. The Lima Kewpee locations have locally raised beef delivered daily to each Kewpee restaurant. The Kewpee Restaurant in downtown Lima, Ohio is considered an historic site. For our convenience, one of the Kewpee restaurants is across I-75 from the campvention site.

A quick review - Campvention will begin with the non-denominational church service on Sunday July 9 at 6:00 p.m. with the Opening Ceremony beginning at 7:30 p.m.. 'Meet & Greet' Hospitality provided by

the host Great Lakes Region will follow. An 'Ice Breaker' (personal treasure hunt) game will be provided with a drawing for prizes. Campvention activities will begin Monday morning July 10. The General Membership meeting will be Tuesday, July 11 in the evening at 6:00 p.m.. The parade will be Friday morning, July 14, with the Closing Ceremony being Friday evening. The grounds will be vacated by noon on Saturday July 15.





On the back of the picture print:



"This trailer means that we don't have to sit around all summer dreaming of going camping and weighing the pros and cons of camping in a tent. Being an amputee, it's sometimes difficult to see the outdoors as an option for any period of time. It's really important to keep my residual limb clean and a trailer is really the best option to do that."

In addition to using the travel trailer for family vacations, both veterans intend to pay it forward by taking other veterans camping.

"I'm thankful to now have the opportunity to help other veterans by leaving all their chaos and troubles away, even if for just a weekend," said North Carolina-based, A Warrior's Wish recipient Brown. "I am more at peace in the wilderness, allowing me to clear my mind. The flexibility the travel trailer provides will help with the daily, never-ending memories of war that haunt me when I am trapped inside my home."

"While serving in the military, many service members make unimaginable lifelong sacrifices," said Robin Kelleher, president and CEO of Hope For The Warriors. "We're excited that these travel trailers will bring some solace and relaxation to both veterans. The A Warrior's Wish program is the small way we, at Hope For The Warriors, can help military members and their families move along with their civilian lives while thanking them for their incredible service to our country."

In 2017, 12 wishes will be granted through Hope For The Warriors. The wishes fulfill a desire for a better quality of life or support a quest for gratifying endeavors for those who have sustained severe physical and psychological wounds in the line of duty.

Are you ready to kick-off the outdoor recreation season? We sure are and we have some important information to share. First, be aware that some locations received more snow and rain than normal, which could delay seasonal openings. Make sure to check in with local offices as your reservation date approaches or prior to visiting a first-come, first-serve site.

Second, many reservation fees on Recreation.gov increased, or will be increasing in the next few weeks. These increases are variable depending on the type of reservation and are a result of an increased cost of providing online, call center and field location services. Most of the increases range from .05 cents to \$1.00 and may be reflected when making camping, cabin or day-use reservations on Recreation.gov; in some cases you will see that increase right away, in others, it may take some time for the change to occur. The lottery and permit locations will experience an increase of up to \$4.00 or more, which more accurately reflects the cost of implementing these more complex recreation opportunities. The last time we raised our reservation fees was more than 10 years ago.

Tips for Preventing and Treating Venomous Snakebites

When gearing up to enjoy warmer weather and to partake in outdoor adventures, many people take typical safety measures: sunblock to prevent sun damage, a first-aid kit for cuts and bruises, flight-or-fight response for the often-feared bear encounter. But while these larger animals have captured the public imagination for wildlife dangers, in many parts of the country, smaller and more difficult-to-spot critters pose a serious threat: venomous snakes.

Of the different types of snakes across the U.S., the most common venomous snakes are North American Pit Vipers like rattlesnakes, water moccasins and copperheads. Around 8,000 venomous snakebites occur each year in the U.S. As the weather gets warmer, snakes become

more active and make snakebites more common, with four out of five cases occurring between April and September. Before heading outside, make sure you know how to avoid and

ous, permanent injury.

Prevention

Learning to dress properly for outdoor activities can prevent a great outdoor experience from turning unpleasant or even deadly. As many bites occur below the knee, leg protection is key. Heavy clothing, including long pants and high boots, can help shield from snakebites.

Whether hiking deep in the woods or relaxing in a park, you should be careful, because venomous snakes are easily camouflaged and generally defend themselves only when

provoked. In particular, don't reach or step into grassy areas where snakes hide, or under bushes and logs. When exploring your surroundings, it also is critical to supervise young children. Children are more likely than adults to suffer from snake bites, because greater amounts of venom are injected in relation to their smaller body size.

Treatment

If you encounter a snake, show it the proper respect and take two giant steps backward to get out of striking range. Even if you believe the snake to be dead, be careful and do not handle it, because it may not always be easy to tell if a snake is venomous or not.

In the event that you or a companion are bitten by a snake, you should act quickly and take the bite seriously. Call 911 immediately and transport the bite victim to the emergency department as soon as possible. A physician should decide whether to administer an antivenom medication which can counter the ef-



cottonmouth water moccasin

fects of a venomous snakebite. Although a bite may look harmless and the snake may not appear venomous, always seek medical help. The longer it takes for a patient to receive

treatment, the harder it is to effectively treat the bite and the more potential for long-term damage.

While you should always seek help from medical professionals for a snakebite, you too can take steps to help the victim. As snakebites can cause swelling, remove the victim's jewelry and any tight-fighting clothes, including shoes. To prevent further swelling, keep the bite area raised. Since an increased heart rate can advance the rate at which the venom spreads, make sure you calm the victim and keep him/her as still as possible.

Despite what you might expect, NSAIDS (nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs, such as Advil® (ibuprofen), Motrin® (ibuprofen), Aleve® (naproxen sodium), or other anti-inflammatory medications) and remedies that are directly applied to the wound, such as cold packs or ice, tourniquets and suction, are actually harmful and can cause further damage.

By taking these steps, you can help keep you and your family safe this summer. If you have any questions, call the National Poison Control Center at (800) 222-1222. For on-the-go support, check out the SnakeBite911 App Suite (for iPhone and Android devices) for useful information about snake safety and basic Pit Viper first aid.



Mini Grilled Blackberry Cobbler



I always make sure I have extra Basic Baking Mix in my supplies, in case I run across a bounty of fresh berries. This recipe is very forgiving if pickings are slim or the berries don't make it back to the campsite—you end up with a more cake-like dessert. The nuttier texture of whole wheat pairs well with the berries, but use plain if you prefer.

Ingredients:

2 cups fresh or 2 (6-ounce) containers fresh blackberries or raspberries 1/2 plus 2 tablespoons sugar, divided 3 tablespoons butter 1/4 cup Whole Wheat or Basic Baking Mix 2/3 cup milk

Prep at Home:

Prepare baking mix and combine with 1/2 cup sugar; label and store in an airtight container.

At Campsite: Prepare a charcoal fire or a gas grill with lid for indirect heat. Wash berries; drain but do not pat dry (the moisture will allow the sugar to stick to the fruit). Combine berries and 2 tablespoons sugar in a bowl

or plastic bag; set aside.

Melt butter in an 8-inch cast-iron skillet. Combine baking mix with 1/2 cup sugar and milk in a bowl. Pour batter into skillet over melted butter, stirring gently to combine. Sprinkle fruit evenly on top. Grill over indirect heat, covered with grill lid, 40 minutes or until batter has risen and center is done. Let stand 5 minutes. Serve warm or chilled.

Basic Baking Mix recipe — 4 cups

Ingredients:

- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 tablespoons baking powder
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup vegetable shortening

Prep at Home:

Combine flour, baking powder, sugar, and salt in a food processor. Add shortening; pulse until mixture resembles coarse meal.

Note: If you don't have a food processor, combine flour, baking powder, sugar, and salt in a large bowl. Add shortening; blend with a pastry blender or fork. Mixture will be slightly lumpy. Store in an airtight container up to 3 months.

Variations:

Real Butter Baking Mix: Substitute butter for vegetable shortening. Store in an airtight container.



On A Roll: RVers Show No Signs of Slowing Down

Millions of recreational vehicles crisscross the country each year. There are many different types of vehicles to enjoy, including motor homes, such as this Type C, which teams a standard car with a camper.

The 36-footer is just waiting for the sign, which, in this case, will be Laura Pellegrino's foot on the gas pedal.

"I've cleaned it out. I'm beginning to stock it, and now I am just itching to pull out and get out of here," she says of her motor home docked at her Stamford house.

Pellegrino works full time, so she is largely a long-weekend or a week-at-a-time kind of vacation traveler. She is waiting for retirement to hit the open road for extended trips with her RV to the Midwest and beyond, to see such places as the Grand Canyon and the Hoover Dam. In the past, she's hunkered down at Hammonasset Beach State Park in Madison and Mineral Springs in Stafford Springs and campsites in Rhode Island for shorter stays; she's gone on weeklong forays to Maine, Florida, Lake George, N.Y., and Delaware, picking up friends along the way.

"People RV to do it for fun and to meet people," Pellegrino says recently by phone. "It's absolutely social. ... you can go about the day and do what you want and then at night, someone might light a fire in the fire pit and your neighbor next door brings some cake and you put on a pot of coffee and you sit around the



fire and talk. It doesn't matter where you came from, it's just a chance to meet people from all over."

If you think RVing has taken a hit because of gas prices or a growing societal trend to log one's experiences vicariously through digital media, you would be mistaken. The number of RVs on the road is the highest it has ever been, at 9 million, according to the Recreation Vehicle Industry Association.

"Growth of the industry has been pretty steady. It's an interest that has been long-held by many people, particularly as they retire," says Kevin Broom, association spokesman. "Many set out to hit the road in an RV and see the country. The desire for that lifestyle has been strong and remains so."

Shipments hit a record last year, and Broom expects it will be broken this year. Retirees may be the bread-and-butter of the RV legions, but there are plenty of others out there. The typical RVer is a bit younger, at nearly 50, according to a recent survey by the RVIA, and nearly 40 percent of RVers have children under 18 living at home.

Historians peg the dawn of RV travel to the first decade of the 20th century, 1910 to be exact, the year the first motorized campers were built for commercial sale. A tad more rustic than today's models, they still provided a home away from home as travelers puttered about a country that had yet to build a transcontinental network of paved roads. As interest grew, so did the amenities, including bathrooms, electricity, solar panels, high-end appliances and docking stations. There are huge top-of-the-line motor homes, where owners replicate a land-locked abode, while smaller versions may still provide many amenities, but in a more maneuverable package.

For those who like to tow their lodgings, there are plenty of ways to do that, including fifth wheels and other trailers, as well as campers. Prices for new vehicles range from several thousand dollars for a folding, or pop-up, camper to several million dollars for what are called Class A motor homes. The motorized RVs can be gas-guzzlers, averaging six to eight miles per

gallon, but studies have found RVers save money by not eating out or staying at hotels (even if they are paying campground fees).

For nearly 10 years, Pellegrino has been on the board of the Connecticut chapter of the Good Sam Club, the largest RV club in the world. It's an indication of the community that RVers tend to engender. Take a quick cruise online and you can find a club for your specific set of wheels (Airstream, Bounder, Coachmen, Gulf Stream, Winnebago and others), interests (golf, nature, agri-tourism), solo travelers and families, as well new, experienced and year-round RVers. While tooling around, you also get a sense of the different types of RVs. Those who have been at it awhile suggest talking to experienced travelers before plunking down money. You can rent one, too, to see whether the lifestyle is a fit before committing to it.

A friendly disposition might be a common trait among many RV travelers, but they also cite the freedom to travel where and when they want; the chance to unplug and connect with family; travel with pets and save money. The idea of traveling to far-off places, yet feeling at home at the end of the day is a large part of the draw, says Massachusetts resident Sandie Bock, president of the Northeast Network Chapter of RVing Women, which includes Connecticut. Bock and her partner have been RVing for more than 10 years. They plan to travel to Montana later this year and stay awhile.

"At night, you can put your feet up, have a full, home-cooked dinner and relax," she says. "You feel more at home. There is this layer of comfort."

Pellegrino is hoping to make it to the Jersey shore sometime this summer with her daughter, Helen, another RVer, who is president of the Southern Connecticut Rowdy Raiders, one of about 10 chapters of the Connecticut Good Sam Club.

"I'm counting the weeks," Pellegrino says. chennessy@hearstmedia.com
