CPR/First Aid Class at 2018 Campvention

Our National DSAT Director has been following up suggestions from the CPR seminars held in Lima, Ohio last summer. He has found an instructor certified through the American Heart Association that is willing to conduct classes in CPR and First Aid for us in Doswell, VA.

The cost is \$40.00 per person for CPR class, and the First Aid class is \$10.00 for a total of \$50.00 per person. It is recommended that everyone takes both classes together as they go hand in hand. This is a very intense training showcasing all of the new methods for both CPR and First Aid. The minimum is 5 students

Once the participants have finished both and passed, they will receive a Certificate of Completion which is good for two years. There is no written test for this certification.

This CPR training is recognized as more accurate because the American Red Cross has not been keeping up with the new methods and updates established by doctors in the heart field of medicine.

In order to schedule CPR class in Doswell, VA, the Campvention Committee needs to get a feel from our members how many want and are willing to pay for classes. If there is adequate interest, we will have class or classes in the Campvention Schedule.

If you are interested in taking these classes at the cost of \$50.00, please respond. If there is enough interest, there will be a pre-registration form in the May issue of Camping Today.







NASCAR Camping

We've all camped in state, local and national parks, campgrounds and RV resorts, but a completely



different experience is at a NASCAR Race. You can camp from the Monday before race weekend until the following Monday morning. At the larger tracks you can camp in the infield or with most tracks you park

in a reserved area or first come first serve on the outside of the track. Pretty much all camping is paid boondocking, no WES connections. They do provide free showers and portapotties. You can use generators, purchase additional water if needed or pay for a pump out if needed. Prices vary per race track but in the \$25-\$50 per service. Camping ranges from free, to \$60 for FCFS, to \$175 for reserved to \$500 or more for an infield site for the week. Campsites are very tight, often sized 20x40, so many people get 2

sites for the camper and truck or toad and a place to socialize.

Like regular camping, everyone is very friendly, comparing rigs or where you are from to what races you have been to in the last few years. Most race fans

raise their flags proudly showing the American flag and then their favorite driver flags or a NASCAR flag. Food is very plentiful with snacks, meals and full blown barbecues everyday. Campfires at night in raised fire-



pits with more snacks and lots more socializing.

And then there is the race activities, practices, time trials and different races for races trucks, Xfinity cars (Saturday) and the Cup cars (Sunday). Vendors selling or giving away products, food vendors, and lots of automobile sponsors, a real circus environment. Camping at a NASCAR event is like participating in an FCRV Convention but just a different group of people.

For all of our RV members that are not Fulltimers or Snow-birds.... it's time to get your RV ready for a new season...

So, winter cover off, check your batteries for the correct level of distilled water. Check for coolant in your MHs, oil level in your generators, air pressure in your tires.

Now for the RV.... flush the antifreeze out of your pipes, then turn the bypass valves on your water heater and flush the heater and then fill it. Now turn on your propane and light the stove, this is the quickest way to get propane flowing in your pipes. Now, click on your refrigerator on gas, change the mode to LP if you are plugged into electricity. Light the water heater on gas and also check your furnace by turning on and pushing up the thermostats. If any don't light, it may be because of a spider web or for the refrigerator, rust may have dropped down from the heating tube above the burner. You may need to get a straw or hose to blow out the web or the rust.

Snowbirds Flocking to Arizona; Facilities Fill Up

The snowbird business is up this winter at RV parks and resorts across the Valley of the Sun, according to a release from the Arizona Association of RV Parks and Campgrounds (AZ ARVC).

"Several of our members are telling us this has been an extremely busy winter," said Jo Ann Mickelson, executive director of the Arizona Association of RV Parks and Campgrounds, which hosts GoCampingInArizona.com, the travel planning website.

"We are very busy," said Vickie Jepperson, general manager of Pueblo El Mirage RV & Golf Resort in El Mirage, which offers snowbirds 1,236 RV, park model and manufactured home sites. She added that RVing snowbirds who are just passing through Arizona on their way to another destination are having a hard time finding a campsite.

She attributes some of the increase to snowbirds who normally spend the winter at parks in Texas and Florida but couldn't do so this winter because of last year's hurricanes and floods in those states.

"We are absolutely up," said Angie Sherman of Apache Palms RV Park in Tempe, which has 80 RV sites.

Eric Vargas, general manager of the 218-site Desert Edge RV Park in Phoenix, said he has seen an uptick in business, too. "This season, February has been a lot busier than last season," he said.

The 377-site Leaf Verde RV Resort in Buckeye is also seeing more snowbirds this winter.

"We have been sold out a couple of days recently, and the rest of February and most of March we're almost sold out," said Connie Jenkinson, Leaf Verde's general manager.

Palm Creek Golf & RV Resort in Casa Grande, for its part, is at 100% occupancy, according to Cristin Zanocco, a divisional marketing coordinator for Sun RV Resorts and Sun Communities Inc., which owns the resort. Palm Creek has 961 RV sites as well as 731 park models and 503 manufactured home sites.

Some parks are also planning to make significant improvements in the future, including Apache Palms RV Resort, which plans to open a bistro next fall.




