

VISIT MONTGOMERY, ALABAMA

State Capital

Interested in....visiting state capitals?....Old South history?....Civil Rights history?.....jazz?.....haunted tours?.....riverboat trips? Attending the 2020 FCRV Retiree Rally in Dothan, Alabama March 24-29th? We a place to visit about 2 hours northwest have of Dothan.....Montgomery, Alabama, worth the visit going to, while at the rally on an early day, or following the rally where you can satisfy all of these interests.....or, pick and choose.

Montgomery is the capital of the state of Alabama, is named after Richard Montgomery (Google him; an interesting read), and is situated on the Alabama River. Montgomery was incorporated in 1819 as a merger of two towns along the river. In 1846 it became the state capital

and became the first capital of the Confederate States of America in February, 1861. (In May, 1861, the Confederate seat of government was moved to Richmond, VA.) The middle of the 20th century brought Montgomery to the forefront of the Civil Rights movement which included the Montgomery bus boycott and the Selma to Montgomery marches.


Visit the state capitol, Old Alabama Town, the Alabama State Archives and History Museum, First White House of the Confederacy, Rosa Parks Library and Museum, the Civil Rights Memorial, Dexter Avenue King Memorial Baptist Church....the list goes on.



First Confederacy White House

Montgomery and jazz? Nat King Cole and Zelda Fitzgerald stand out. Both were born in Montgomery. Nat King Cole was a noted jazz pianist and vocalist who recorded over a hundred songs that be-

came hits on the pop charts. "His trio was the model for small jazz ensembles that followed." He acted in films and on television as well as performed on Broadway. He also the first African-American man to host an American television series, The Nat King Cole Show.



Civil Rights Memorial

Zelda Fitzgerald, though not a jazz musician like Nat King Cole, was dubbed 'America's First Flapper' by her husband F. Scott Fitzgerald. She was immersed in the Jazz Age. She was a writer and artist in her right, but was overshadowed by her famous husband. Her tumultuous life ended prematurely when the

Jazz Age party queen died in a fire while sedated & locked in a room waiting for her electroshock therapy. She's also an interesting read. And, visit Scott & Zelda Fitzgerald Museum to learn about the Fitzgeralds and the Jazz Age. Better

yet, experience jazz and blues at the Sous La Terre, legendary blues and jazz club.

Haunted Montgomery tours interest you? When Googling these tours, they sound so interesting, exploring the dark history of Montgomery. The most interesting is the tour in a hearse. Seats have been installed for tourists where the hearse would have been carried.



Dexter Avenue King Memorial **Baptist Church**

Board the riverboat Harriott II in downtown Montgomery and enjoy a relaxing tour of Montgomery from the Alabama River. Evening dinner tours are also offered. After a day of touring, perhaps an evening on the river on a 19th century paddle-wheeler would be the perfect completion of your day.

Dakota Zoo, in Bismarck, ND, recently received a \$600 national Family Campers & RVers (FCRV) wildlife refuge grant.

Submitted in May by State FCRV Director

JeAnne Selby, Bismarck, on behalf of the Dakota Zoo, the grant request sought national FCRV wildlife funds for the Zoo's raptor rehabilitation program.

According to Zoo Di-

rector Terry Lincoln, the award will be used to replenish x-ray supplies and blood level lead test kits for assessing injured and orphaned raptors brought to the Zoo for treatment and rehabilitation.

The FCRV Wildlife Refuge program offers financial grants to governmental and private organizations to assist them in wildlife conservation projects. The grant requests must be submitted to the national FCRV Wildlife Refuge directors by an FCRV member and be accompanied by a letter of concurrence from an agency/organization.

THE RVERS TO LAUNCH ON DISCOVERY CHANNEL NOV. 17

As creator and producer of a hit TV series, Anthony Nalli knows a good story when he sees one. Nalli's *The Aviators*, now in its eighth season, reaches a weekly U.S. audience of over 9.3 million viewers on the Discovery Channel, PBS, and through a slew of digital outlets including AppleTV, Amazon Prime Video and Google Play.

But airplanes, it seems, are not Nalli's only passion. Four years ago, he sold his home and with his wife and two rescue dogs took to the road as a full-time RVer. The RVers uses the same formula that has worked so successfully for *The Aviators*, Nalli told *RVBusiness*. "People buy experiences, not things. Our focus is on the people living the RV lifestyle and their experiences throughout their travels. In telling the story, we incorporate plenty of useful information and product-related content in an entertaining way."

RVBusiness recently previewed Episode 1 in which the show takes a potential Millennial motorhome owner and puts her behind the wheel of a 40-foot diesel pusher. Often on the edge of her seat, she experiences the dos and don'ts of big rig driving under real-world conditions. "This is something everyone can relate to," Nalli says, "We've all started there and can remember our first time. So it was fun to ride along when someone else is in the driver's seat."

To help tell *The RVers* story, Nalli has enlisted some stellar names within the RV community. Serving as hosts are:

Peter Knize & John Sullivan, commonly known as <u>The RV Geeks</u>: Their popular YouTube channel receives millions of views as they specialize in Do-It-Yourself and How-To videos helping fellow RVers learn to maintain, repair, and upgrade the systems on their RVs.

Chris Dunphy & Cherie Ve Ard of <u>Technomadia</u>: Who better to help RVers overcome the many challenges of keeping connected on the road than these technology-enabled nomads. Their website and social media channels are a trusted resource for thousands of RVers seeking a connection.

Tom & Caitlin Morton, best know as <u>Mortons on the Move:</u> This young couple left their jobs, sold their house and possessions, and hit the road in 2015, giving up the stationary life for one where they are always on the move. For anyone thinking about dipping their toe in the RV lifestyle, the Morton's adventures are a must -see.

Sponsorship support for the series has been enthusiastic, according to Nalli. "We actually got call-backs from potential advertisers. If you're in advertising sales, you know that this is practically unheard of."

One major sponsor (Nalli refers to them as "Friends") is **Dometic North America**. "Partnering with *The RVers* was a natural fit for Dometic," said VP of Marketing Trey Miller. "We have existing relationships with nearly the entire cast, and when we heard about the opportunity, we jumped on it in a big way."

"The series concept fills a noticeable void for the RVing community. When you look at the fact that there are up to 10 million RVs on the road and around 25 million individuals actively participating in the RV lifestyle, it is a perfect concept to bring to national television and streaming services. Add the countless millions of potential RVers out there now being exposed to this content on mass media, and it ratchets up the potential impact to the next level."

Another charter friend/sponsor of *The RVers* is **Truma Corp**. Head of Marketing John Jambor explained his company's participation this way: "We anticipate the series will be a big success based on the growing interest in RVing as well as Anthony's proven success with *The Aviators*.

"Nalli's choice of hosts for *The RVers* was another selling point for us. <u>The RV Geeks</u>, <u>Technomadia</u>, and <u>Mortons on the Move</u> are highly recognized names in social media and web. We have worked with some of them independently, and their participation adds credibility and a potentially huge following."

Nalli thinks *The RVers* will be as big a success as *The Aviators*. Perhaps even bigger. "We are starting with an established base of over 30 million RVers, people that are already committed to the lifestyle. That's about 80 times more RVers than there are private or commercial pilots, so we have a massive advantage in potential audience size," he noted. TESLA CONCEPT ELECTRIC TRUCK OFFERS POP-UP CAMPER

Electric-car manufacturer Tesla just <u>released</u> its highly anticipated <u>Cybertruck</u> in an over-the-top per-

formance meant to demonstrate the truck's ruggedness. *Curbed* reported that the new truck will come in three versions with a range between 250-500 miles, but the most interesting part



for outdoor enthusiasts was a rendering that showed a futuristic pop-up tent set up on the back of the Cyber-truck.

Made from ultra-hard 30X cold-rolled stainless steel, the oddly shaped, punk-inspired Cybertruck features a wide windshield, angular proportions, and a sloped rear end that looks drastically different from other trucks on the market. The rendering shows a pull-out kitchen on the right hand side as well as a foldable countertop area for food prep. The sleeping quarters are under a pop-up tent with what looks to be a bed for two.


Each truck can seat a total of six adults on the road, with a payload of 3,500 pounds and 100 cubic feet of storage space. The single motor rear-wheel drive truck will be able to tow 7,500 pounds, while the triple motor all-wheel drive should tow 14,000 pounds. That's good news for anyone looking to pull campers and trailers with an electric truck, and another rendering shows the Cybertruk pulling a boxy, futuristic looking travel trailer.

The long-lasting 90 kilowatt hour batteries on the car allows for climate control and air filtration all night long, without any tailpipe emissions or sound. The seats also fold flat, prompting one company to make <u>bed kits specifically for Tesla models</u>.

OVERLANDING GEAR

Overlanding is a mix of off-roading and camping, often in remote areas where experiencing the journey is the goal. weBoost asked a number of experts what their top piece of gear/device/advice is for staying connected when overlanding. While the responses varied, there were some overarching themes:

- 1. Communication never ends at a cell phone level. Always have a contingency means of communication. Electronics can fail, so having multiple choices betters your odds of being able to connect with someone when you're off the grid. Recommended potential options include:
 - A cell phone with a weBoost Drive Reach or Drive 4G-X OTR
 - 25W Rugged Radio GMRS
 - 60W Rugged Radio GMRS
 - CB radio
 - Ham radio
 - A dedicated hotspot with unlimited data

Ultimately, whatever system allows you to dial home, or get that critical message out, is what matters the most.

2. Tell people where you're going. Give friends and family an itinerary so that if something happens, rescue services have a good chance of rescue. Recommended gear includes:

- SPOT locator
- Garmin inReach

3. Be prepared for a medical emergency. Have a good first aid kit and refresh yourself on your medical knowledge. Recommended gear:

• Outer Limit Supply First Aid Kit
