VISIT TERRELL, TEXAS

The 50th FCRV International Retiree Rally will be taking us to Mineola, Texas in March. Mineola is a new venue for us. Last month I shared Mineola's history and what to expect and see while attending the rally.

This month, I want to 'travel' about 50 miles west of Mineola to share Terrell, Texas, a 'visit-spot' during the early days at the rally site. Like Mineola, Terrell was settled as a railroad town with the construction of the Texas and Pacific Railroad Line in 1873 when 'King Cotton' was the cash crop. (Today, it is the principal commercial center of Kaufman County.) The town was named for Robert A. Terrell, a European-American pioneer whose farm was on the town's western edge. Terrell and his bride Emily Love came to the area soon after marrying in 1846 when they built a log cabin which was located just to the south of the present

house and raised their nine children. Terrell is reported to have said he “once killed a bear in their front yard, and he could sit on his front porch and shoot deer and turkey”.



He later built the octagonal house, called the Round House, on his property. The house was built possibly as early as 1860 when a master carpenter M. Goodfellow from New Brunswick, Canada was living in the Terrell household, according to the 1860 census. The architecture was a very new innovative idea for the time. It was built this way for the light and the air circulation. The logs for the foundation were brought by wagon from East Texas and hand-hewn on the site. The octagonal house originally faced south and turned to face west in 1914 when the Texas Military College was established on part of the Terrell farm. It served as the mess hall for many years. The Round House is located on the campus of Southwestern Christian College which purchased the property in 1949.

Terrell was incorporated in 1875. It's noted that the first automobile appeared in 1899, which appears to be a momentous historical event!

While in Terrell, plan to visit the **Terrell Heritage Museum** (207 N. Frances Street) which is housed in the Carnegie Building which was built in 1904 with money donated by Scottish-American businessman and philanthropist Andrew Carnegie as a library. A total of 2,509 Carnegie libraries were built between 1883 and 1929. The Carnegie Building operated as a library until the mid-1980s. It is now the home of the Terrell Heritage Museum, displaying artifacts from Terrell's past. Free admission! www.terrellheritage.org



No. 1 British Flying Training School Museum (119 Silent Wings Blvd Terrell Municipal Airport) is



worth a visit as it is of the only RAF Museum currently in the United States. The museum is located at the site of one of six British Flying Training Schools operated in the US during WW II. It was a civilian flight school dedicated to instructing and training British Royal Air Force (RAF) pilots during the war. Why Terrell? “RAF officials sought to train aircrews outside of England, safe from enemy attack

and poor weather. The cadets trained in the air on aerobatics, instrument flight, and night flying, while on the ground they studied navigation, meteorology, engines, and armaments, even spending time in early flight simulators. More than 2,000 RAF cadets trained in Terrell.” And, did you know that it is roughly the same distance from Terrell to Houston as it is from London to Paris!! Lawrence Phillips added that in the Terrell Cemetery there is a plot where several RAF Airmen are buried who died in a training accident. www.bftsmuseum.org



Books & Crannies, 209 W. Monroe Ave, sounds like an interesting visit. “Books & Crannies is an independent bookstore located in historic downtown Terrell. We offer all genres of books (mostly used), a locally produced line of skin care items (Susan's Soaps and More), and we have an upscale ladies consignment shop is in the same building with us. We also have a small movie theatre in the back of the store. We take gently used books in for trade credit.” www.bookscrannies.com and on YouTube at <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=gNEEz-kMR4E&t=28s>

Downtown Terrell is a turn-of-the-century historic district complete with vintage lighting, wide brick sidewalks, and updated historic buildings with unique storefronts featuring great architectural details. Hand-

painted murals add to the uniqueness of the area. Wayfaring Kiosks will aid your exploration of the historic district.

As an added note: Jamie Foxx, two-time Grammy Award-winning musician and singer, and Academy Award-winning actor, lived in Terrell and graduated in 1986.

Judy Elenburg suggested a couple of places to visit while in Terrell where she lives. First, the Front Porch is an interesting gift shop owned by one of her former principals, at 304 Catherine St. And, Jake E' Riding Roundup is another place that might be of interest. It's an equestrian therapy for disabled children and adults. It's address is Kaufman but it's just east of Terrell. (10626 FM 249, Kaufman, TX) She said you can visit and even volunteer to greet kids or groom horses. Their hours are Mon-Fri 8am to 5pm. She's been there once with her Retired School Personnel group.

Planning on the Early Days (March 19-22) at the 2021 FCRV International Retiree Rally? If so, plan on a day-trip to Terrell! See you in Mineola!

‘WANDER WISCONSIN’ CAMPGROUND SUGGESTIONS

Harnischfeger County Park



Here is a nice little Dodge County park just north of Oconomowoc on Hwy 67 and west of Ashippun off CTH O and Crawfish Rd along the Rock River. Little as in relation to the number of sites for camping – nine. They are back in sites as you can see above. Three are Non-electric tent sites. Yet this campground is 132 acres. It has miles of trails by the river or across the county side. There is 30-amp service with water at select sites and a picnic table and fire ring. The sites are somewhat level; I needed a 2x8 on one side and lowered the front a little. My neighbor just had to push a button and the hydraulics leveled his unit, modern technology!

Getting back to the Park they have a terrific Mini Golf course and a challenging Disk course across the fields and into the woods and around. This year on the mini golf you had to use your own putter, ball, and score card, which was okay with us, I carry some along just in case. And who doesn’t have a Frisbee in their rig someplace? The playground is huge; one of the trails splits the various rides and slides. (Bring your trusty hand sanitizer to use afterwards). If you are a canoeist or kayaker this is the place for you. The Rock River is a popular place to canoe, used by campers and those that just drive in, with a good entry/exit point. The park has kayaks or canoes to rent. If you carry your canoe you can check the map for entry sites above the campground and float back, or go down river to an exit point on the map. It is a good place to fish with 800’ of river frontage and board walks. Our Wisconsin DNR has a Fishing permit for short periods of time for your vacation spent here in Wisconsin



Shady sites are limited as you can see. The trails are kept mowed plenty wide for disk golf and hiking in groups. You’ll love the Arch on the trail along the river. Don’t leave the mosquito spray in the rig it might come in handy! There are two restored barns on the property and a Shed area for antique farm machinery is under construction. There is potable water and a dump station on the entrance road. Showers and flush toilets are available. Bundles of firewood are available to purchase. As sign says, camping by reservation only so go online Dodge County, Wi and make your reservations and Wander Wisconsin!

OLD WORLD WISCONSIN

‘Wander Wisconsin’ is the theme for Campvention 2021. Over the months leading up to Campvention, various suggestions will be shared to enhance your Wisconsin & Campvention experience.



To learn about early Wisconsin, visit Old World Museum which is an open-air museum about 20 miles north of Elkhorn, site of Campvention 2021. Step back into time to the early 19th century, visiting the various structures of the museum and listening to volunteers in period attire in the separate areas which depict the traditions of the various ethnic groups that settled the state.



Old World Wisconsin opened in 1976 and is owned and operated by the Wisconsin Historical Society. Interestingly, it is the largest outdoor museum of rural life in the United States, encompassing 480 acres with more than 60 historic structures. For ease of mobility, trams run between the Scandinavian & German, African-American, and Crossroads villages.



The themed-parks that represent typical settlement from various immigrant cultures: African-American, Danish, Finnish, German, Norwegian, Polish, and the Yankee/1880s Village. Each area contains period structures with volunteers who help you step back into time. Experience the areas and the times.



Margrethe II, the queen of Denmark, dedicated the Danish exhibit on May 14, 1976. The museum officially opened on June 30, 1976 in time for the United States Bicentennial celebration.

Plan to visit Old World Wisconsin next July when you travel to Campvention 2021 in Elkhorn, Wisconsin!

Note: Old World Wisconsin is presently operating under COVID – 19 protocols with reservations required and some areas not open. We hope by July 2021 the museum will be open and operating. Learn about Old World Wisconsin at https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Old_World_Wisconsin.



DISASTER STRIKES

Wow, what a very eventful past several months we all have experienced. Let us put this into perspective for a few minutes. Our environment as we know it has changed and continues to change. If you were to look at a map of our continent, what would you

see? The west coast is on fire, acres and acres of timberland, homes, businesses, and communities of all sizes and shapes have just vanished in seconds as the fires have spread from community to community. Our neighbors to the north in Canada, are experiencing some of the destruction as well as the fires continue to spread in all directions. Several lives has been lost, too. Moreover, the fires seem to be taking over the entire west coast countryside. People have had only minutes to evacuate-grabbing their belongings and leaving not knowing if they will ever come back to their homes again.



Some of these fires started because of carelessness, and others began by various stormy weather conditions. Fire and smoky conditions persist, and the smoke is crossing the country from the west coast to the east coast as wind conditions persist. The clouds of smoke are creating dangerous breathing conditions for everyone. Masks are of some help, staying inside with filtered air helps but overall the danger persists.

In the gulf coastal area, hurricane after hurricane, and various tropical storms have struck that area of the country. Wind and flooding conditions have left their mark. Homes have been blown apart, others were washed away, and others have extensive damage. The electricity is out and may be out for several weeks, or even months, bottled water is essential because the main water supply in many of these areas is contaminated and unsafe for drinking.



The northeast has experienced a deluge of various coastal tropical storms as they have come up the coastline. This has produced flooding conditions as the rivers and stream over flowed their banks. The center of the country has experienced tornadoes, and a derechos passing through, extremely high winds, wind shear, and straight-line winds, and alike. The destruction this year has just grown from location to location all across the country.

In all cases as briefly described above, do you know what to do and are you prepared for such a disaster. For a quick review, do you have a “to-go” bag packed and ready to “go”? If not, then consider packing one and having it on hand. If you have to evacuate, no matter the reason, that is not the time-to decide what to do- as you are frankly too late and unprepared. As a quick review, a “to go-bag”



should contain a flashlight, water, copies of important documents, a first-aid kit, masks, your person hygiene items, prescriptions, blankets, and several days of clothing to name some of the essentials. Your to go bag, should be specific to you-therefore it will vary slightly from person to person. Remember each person in your family should have a “to-go” bag or a very large one with the necessary items for everyone. Put your items in some sort of carrying bag, as you may have to carry it from one place to another. Do you know where you would go? Where are the evacuation centers for your given areas? What roads can you take-the evacuation route? Planning is important-you may have



never realized how important the RV could be for you in an emergency such as these. If you need additional, information about the “to-go” bags and its contents, consult the web site ready.gov. Look under the heading [building a kit](#). Just click on the link and you will have more than enough information to assist you in this process.

As Recreation Vehicle owners, you are prepared in many ways because most of us keep basic essential in our RV's year round. Our camping units can serve as places to sleep, if the water tanks are full-you have water. Refrigeration, no problem as you have propane. Get the picture. In many cases, all one has to do is hitch-up and go, or hop into that motorhome and drive to a safer location. Various articles in previous Camping Today Magazines have provided useful resources and materials for using your RV as shelter when one has to evacuate. A word of caution, they are not safe shelters during high winds or a tornado as you may find yourself in extreme danger in these instances. In this case, best to relocate to a stronger facility or building. If possible, go to a storm shelter until the danger has subsided. Remember in all cases to be informed and follow the advice of your local authorities, as they will make the best decisions regarding your safety in your community.

Going forward it is important that while natural disasters are occurring the pandemic continues to exist. Covid 19 has not gone away it still exists thus making things even more difficult. We still need to take the precautions as set forth by the Center for Disease Control. Wear your mask, if you have to relocate-take your mask with you. Social distancing is still in place-stay six feet apart. Yes, in these uncertain times this is becoming extremely difficult. Thus, the natural disasters along with the pandemic, Covid 19-has made our health and safety concerns even greater. Taking precautions now can save a life. Preparedness-take the time to develop a safety plan for you and your family and be ready for the unexpected. It can happen at a time when we least expect it to occur. The time spend preparing will save you precious time when a disaster strikes. To all, be safe, and think ahead, prepare for things yet to come, as it may catch you totally off guard when you least expect it.





TOGO RV: SAFETY REMINDERS FOR RVERS DURING HURRICANE SEASON

Here at Togo RV, our thoughts are with all the folks in the path of Hurricane Laura, and especially our friends in the RV community. Meteorologists have predicted an extremely active hurricane season, so this will probably not be our only bout with severe weather over the next few months. Here are a few things you can do to prepare for future storms.

1. Avoid planning RV trips to southeastern coastal areas during hurricane season. I know those South Carolina and Alabama beaches are truly beautiful during the autumn months, so if you do make plans, monitor the weather carefully and cancel the trip with the first storm warning.
2. Check in on your RV insurance coverage. Don't wait until after a storm to find out that your RV didn't have the correct coverage. Make a phone call and ask your agent or broker specific questions about RV damage from weather-related events.
3. Never try to ride out a storm in your RV. RVs do not have foundations, and they aren't safe for shelter-in-place conditions. RVs may tip over in high-wind conditions or float away in storm surges.
4. Take your pets with you when evacuating. Never leave a furry family member in an RV during extreme weather.
5. Leave as far in advance as possible if you are evacuating with your RV. An RV is a wonderful way to evacuate to a safe location, but don't wait until the last minute and risk driving in unsafe conditions.

FUEL SAFETY MONTH: TIPS FOR HANDLING FUEL AT PLAY

MIAMI, OKLA. – The summer months unleash our desire to spend time outdoors. Going to the lake, camping and motorcycle activities all require fuel for sporting equipment. During Fuel Safety Month in July, experts at Scepter™ are providing a variety of

safety tips for storing and using fuel in outdoor and sports settings.

“There are many aspects of handling fuel that people should be aware of, especially if there are children participating in the activities,” says Dan Marshall, vice president of marketing and business development with [Scepter™](#). “During Fuel Safety Month we are shining a spotlight on safety tips relevant to outdoor sports items, like fueling up ATVs, jet skis, camp stoves and lanterns.”



Tips: Selecting a Fuel Container

Tip #1 – Inspect your existing fuel container regularly for leaks or cracks. If you see any signs of aging, carefully dispose of the container and purchase a new one.

Tip #2 – If you need to buy a new fuel container, seek out one with controllable flow, child safety features and Flame Mitigation Device (FMD) for safety. Even with an FMD on a unit, fire and fuel should never be mixed.

Tip #3 – Make a smart choice on the size fuel container you need. Many come in smaller sizes such as one-, two- and five-gallons. But there are also rugged 14-gallon wheeled containers available for your needs. And, there are Marine Containers specifically designed for handling fuel transfers for boats.

Tip #4 – Only purchase fuel containers from trusted brands, like Scepter, that are available from top retailers both in store and online.

Tip #5 – Once you have a new fuel container, do not remove or alter the FMD inside the opening of the container in any way.

Tips: Fueling Up at the Pump

Tip #1 – Put only the proper fuel in the proper container. Universally, red containers are for gasoline, blue containers are for kerosene, and yellow containers are for diesel.

Tip #2 – Before going to the pumps, look at the products you require fuel for. Not all fuels are the same. Select the right fuel for your outdoor power and sporting equipment. Do not use fuel that has a higher than recommended ethanol content for your equip-

ment.

Tip #3 – Never allow children to operate pumps or fill up fuel containers.

Tip #4 – Never smoke when filling a gas tank or fuel container.

Tip #5 – Make sure to follow proper filling instructions for containers with FMDs. (see instructional [video](#))

Tip #6 - Remove fuel containers from vehicles before refilling, and turn off your vehicle's engine. Place containers on the ground a safe distance from a vehicle when refilling. Do not leave the containers in the back of a pickup truck or in the trunk of a car when filling.

Tip #7 – Look for a “fuel fill line” on your container. Never fill past this mark. Leaving some space in the container allows for expansion.

Tip #8– Fuel containers can build up a static electric charge during transport. Touch the container with the gas dispenser nozzle before removing the container lid to ground the static electricity charge.

Tip #9 - Keep the nozzle in contact with the container when filling it to prevent build up of a static charge. If a static-caused fire occurs, leave the nozzle in the fill pipe. Immediately move away from the vehicle and notify the station attendant.

Tip #10 - Carefully wipe away any fuel spills, either during the filling of the container or when using the container.

Tip #11 – Secure your filled fuel containers in your vehicle against tipping and sliding. Never leave containers in a car trunk or flat bed, and keep out of direct sunlight.

Tips: Using Fuel for Outdoor Activities

Tip #1 – Use fuel outside only, in well ventilated areas where you will not breathe in the fumes.

Tip #2 – Do not allow children near fuel containers or running equipment.

Tip #3 – Do not smoke when using fuel or when near a fuel container. One spark can cause gasoline vapors to ignite.

Tip #4 – Don't guess. Check beforehand to determine the type of fuel recommended for your ATV, boat, sports equipment and camping needs. Follow all safety recommendations by the product's manufacturer. And, if you use a specific container for a fuel/oil mix, make sure to mark the container with a permanent marker to remind yourself what this container holds for future use.

Tip #5 - Never fuel a piece of equipment, vehicle or boat while it is running. Gasoline is a fluid with fumes that can generate dangerous explosive power.

Tip #6 - Keep gasoline and other types of fuel away from ignition sources and hot or running equipment.

Tip #7 – Should a flammable liquid spill, there can be a vapor or fire hazard. Immediately contact your fire department or local authorities for full cleaning instructions and restrict access to the spill area from children and pets.

Tip #8 – Do not siphon any type of fuel by mouth. Instead, invest in a siphon pump.

Tip #9 – Gasoline is not a lighter fluid. Never try to start or accelerate a bonfire, barbeque, or grill with gasoline. (See an important [video](#) on fire tips)

Tip #10 – Gasoline should never be used as a cleaning agent, or to wash hands

Tips: Marine Safety Tips

Tip #1 – Always remove the marine tank from the boat prior to fueling.

Tip #2 – Before filling the boat tank with fuel, the red plug (in the fuel pick-up) must be replaced with a male quick connect fitting.

Tip #3 – Never fill the tank past the fill line. As part of the fuel vapor retention system, your tank will normally expand under internal pressures, so overfilling is not a good idea.

Tip #4 - Always disconnect the fuel line from the engine or fuel tank when not in use.

Tip #5 - To avoid fuel spray when connecting the fuel line to the tank, ensure all pressure is released from the tank BEFORE connecting. This can be accomplished by unscrewing the vent on the cap and slowly unscrewing the main cap to allow all pressure to escape. Once pressure is relieved, connect the fuel line fitting to the tank and re-tighten cap.

Tips: Disposal of Old Fuel

Tip #1 – Know your fuel. Winter fuel is heavier, and a unique blend. Fuel available in the spring and summer is different and should be used for boating and sporting equipment.

Tip #2 – Dispose of any winter mix of gasoline stored in containers by putting it in your car with a funnel. The small amount of winter fuel will easily mix in with the gasoline in your tank.

Tips: Fuel Can Storage

Tip #1: When not in use, store any filled fuel containers in a secure, dry location away from pets and easy access by children. Never store filled fuel containers in a vehicle or in living space, like a home, camper or trailer.

Tip #2 – When storing in a garage, make sure to store fuel containers away from furnaces, hot water tanks and any other potential source of heat.

Final Tips

To help get you ready for fuel-related tasks around the home, Marshall suggests reviewing safety videos online for important tips.

“Handling fuel and fuel containers is something that should only be done by knowledgeable, responsible people,” says Marshall. “Our hope is that by offering these fuel safety tips that we can help prevent accidents.”

Fuel container safety is such an important topic that the Congressional Fire Services Institute reports a related bill was introduced to Congress on January 28, 2019. The bill directs the Consumer Product Safety Commission to adopt a standard requiring the addition of flame mitigation devices (FMDs) to consumer-grade portable fuel containers. The bill has passed the House of Representatives and is currently being reviewed by the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation.

According to the Portable Fuel Container Manufacturers Association (PFCMA), FMDs are designed to prevent the rare occurrence of the transmission of a flame into a container and then igniting flammable vapor inside the container. The FMD allows a container to safely and effectively function for the user and meet the other standards applicable to portable fuel containers.
