VISIT WISCONSIN'S STATE CAPITAL – MADISON

Our FCRV 2021 Campvention will be held about 50 miles southeast of Wisconsin's state capital – Madison. Many of you over the years have visited state capitals in your travels or have them on your 'bucket list'. Attending Campvention in Elkhorn in July will afford you the opportunity to visit another state capital.

Wisconsin was one of five states created from the Northwest Territory. The Wisconsin Territory was created in 1836 at which time the territorial legislators met in Belmont, Wisconsin. "One of the legislature's tasks was to select a permanent location for the territory's capital. Former federal judge James Doty lobbied aggressively for Madison as the new capital, offering buffalo robes to the freezing legislators and promising choice Madison lots at discount prices to undecided voters. He had James Slaughter plat two cities in the area, Madison and 'The City of Four Lakes', near present-day Middleton." Interestingly, Doty had purchased 1261 acres in 1829 for \$1500 where the legislators agreed to place the state capital.

Attending Campvention in Elkhorn in July will afford you the opportunity to visit another state capital.

Wisconsin was one of five states created from the Northwest Territory. The Wisconsin Territory was created in 1836 at which time the territorial legislators met in Belmont, Wisconsin. "One of the legislature's tasks was to select a permanent location for the territory's capital. Former federal judge James Doty lobbied aggressively for Madison as the new capital, offering buffalo robes to the freezing legislators and promising choice Madison lots at discount prices to undecided voters. He had James Slaughter plat two cities in the area, Madison and 'The City of Four Lakes', near present-day Middleton." Interestingly, Doty had purchased 1261 acres in 1829 for \$1500 where the legislators agreed to place the state capital.

"Doty named his city Madison for James Madison, the fourth President of the U.S. who had died on June 28, 1836, and he named the streets for the other 39 signers of the U.S. Constitution. Although the city existed only on paper, the territorial legislature voted on November 28, 1836 in favor of Madison as its capital, largely because of its location halfway between the new and growing cities around Milwaukee in the east and the long established strategic post of Prairie du Chien in the west, and between the highly populated lead mining regions in the southwest and Wisconsin's oldest city, Green Bay, in the northeast."

A visit to Madison in July could start at Capitol Square, 2 East Main Street. The present Capitol building is actually the third building on which construction began in late 1906 and was completed in 1917. "The architect was George B. Post & Sons from New York. Because of financial limitations and the need for immediate office space to house state government employees, the construction of the new building was extended over several years and emphasized building one wing at a time."



"The Capitol is 284 feet, 5 inches tall from the ground floor to the top of the *Wisconsin* statue on the dome." The statue of a woman on top of the Capitol dome is named *Wisconsin* and is 15' 5" tall and weighs 3 tons. "The statue was sculpted by Daniel Chester French, who also created the <u>Abraham Lincoln statue</u> for the <u>Lincoln Memorial</u>. *Wisconsin* looks toward Lake Monona with her right hand outstretched, while her left hand cradles a globe with an eagle perched on it. On top of her helmet are clusters of grapes and the state animal, the badger. The statue is 23 1/2 caret gold-gilded bronze."

"The capitol was constructed of 43 types of stone from six countries and eight states. The exterior stone is Bethel white granite from Vermont, making the exterior dome the largest granite dome in the world. The corridor floors, walls and columns are of marble from the states of Tennessee, Missouri, Vermont, Georgia, New York, and Maryland; granite from the states of Wisconsin and Minnesota; and limestone from the states of Minnesota and Illinois. Marble from the countries of France, Italy, Greece, Algeria and Germany, and syenite from Norway are also represented. Other Wisconsin granites are located throughout the public hallways on the ground, first, and second floors.

Besides visiting and touring the Capitol, enjoy the various shops and restaurants at Capitol Square.

Visit the Wisconsin Historical Society, 816 State St., to learn the history of Wisconsin. The Society is described as 'the state's memory and foremost storyteller' and is considered as one of our country's finest historical institutions.

At 30 North Carroll Street, visit Wisconsin Historical Society's Museum which houses 110,000 historical objects and about 500,000 archaeological items.





Elvis fans – interested in doing a scavenger hunt? At 3618 E Washington Avenue is a small stone monument in the bushes by the sidewalk. "The small monument marks the spot where, on June 24, 1977, Elvis Presley stopped at a gas station, assumed a karate stance, and broke up a fight." Apparently, the tiny marker is easy to miss. It's on the north side of East Washington Avenue at the edge of a car dealership parking lot. The suggestion is "Park in the small abandoned gas station just west of the marker — the station where the fight actually took place!"

Olbrich Botanical Gardens, 3330 Atwood Ave., (http://www.olbrich.org/) are located on 16 acres near the Madison waterfront. "Started in 1952, the gardens are noted for their collection of roses and the glass-enclosed Bolz Conservatory. Another highlight is the "sala," an elaborate pavilion donated by the government of Thailand and one of only four such buildings outside Asia. The gardens and conservatory are open daily and are free to the public."





The University of Wisconsin - Madison, 500 Lincoln Drive, is a land-grant research university. "UW-Madison is the official state university of Wisconsin and the flagship campus of the University of Wisconsin System." Visit the campus, home of the Badgers. Universities are interesting to visit. Tours are often offered.

Madison offers so much to see and do when visiting. Do your research and plan a visit in July.







SPRING RV & CAMPING SHOW SET FOR RV/MH HALL OF FAME

Study Shows RV Ownership Up 62% With Strong Interest From Millennials

(Reston, VA, March 11, 2021): Last year, Americans took to RV camping in near record numbers. However, 2021 will exceed that enthusiasm with more RVs set to be manufactured this year than at any time in the RV industry's history.

Who is purchasing all these RVs? An ever-expanding audience across every demographic. In fact, the study showed Millennials and Gen Zers are becoming RVers for life with 84% of 18-to-34-year-olds who own an RV are planning to buy another RV in the next 5 years.

Go RVing recently concluded their RV Owner Demographic Profile Study with Ipsos to capsulize the different demographics and travel habits of RVers in America as we head into a record-breaking year for RV camping. The results proved that RVing continues to attract a younger audience with 51% of RV owners under 55-years old.

According to the study, RV ownership is at a record high with 11.2 million households owning an RV in 2021—up 62% over 6.9 million households in 2001 and 26% more than 8.9 million RV-owning households in 2011.

While the RV industry has been experiencing 40 years of long-term growth, the impact of Covid-19 on RV camping has substantially expanded the number of people interested in RV travel. Even as we start to come out of the crisis, the top reasons noted by respondents for this surge in RVing include:

- Ability to control the cleanliness of their environment
- Limit contact with others and still feel like they are vacationing
- Set their own schedule with few restrictions
- Bring everything they want from home including pets
- Get outside and enjoy nature

Nearly a third of the respondents in the study (31 percent) are "first-time owners," underscoring the growth of the industry in the past decade. Ownership is spread widely across all age levels, genders as well as household income and education.

The study also identified seven distinct clusters of RV Owners ranging across demographics, attitudes, RV usage habits, and motivations. These seven clusters help to understand variances in RV owners across more than the type purchased, instead shedding light on the unique motivations, needs, and habits of each type of RVer.



UNRULY CAMPERS BILL MOVING THROUGH INDIANA LEGISLATURE

In a communication Thursday (March 28), the Indiana Manufactured Housing Association-RV Industry Council (IMHA-RVIC) updated its membership on a handful of legislative issues in various stages of activity at the state capitol. The 2021 Indiana General Assembly is moving rapidly with only two more weeks available for committee hearings on legislation that has passed at least one chamber, RVIC noted, and the legislature must end no later than April 29, 2021.

"We are seeing progress on SB 17, which allows the removal of unruly campers from privately owned campgrounds," RVIC officials stated. "Having successfully passed the Indiana State Senate 46-3, the bill has been referred to the House Committee on Courts and Criminal Code. RVIC has been informed SB 17 will receive a committee hearing in the House within the next two weeks, keeping the bill alive and hopefully headed toward becoming law."

Below are some of the other bills RVIC has been tracking and their latest status.

SB 17 CAMPGROUND MATTERS (DORIOT B)

Allows a campground owner to ask an individual to leave a campground in certain instances. Specifies that an individual who remains on, or returns to, a campground after having been asked to leave the campground commits criminal trespass. Provides that a guest who is asked to leave a campground shall receive a refund of any unused portion of prepaid fees. (PASSED STATE SENATE 46-3 AND AWAIT-ING A HOUSE COMMITTEE HEARING).



TRAVELING WITH YOUR PET

Recently we stopped at a local truck stop and I saw a truck driving magazine with an article on having the right dog for the road for travel. While the article was aimed at truck drivers, it made me think that perhaps there would be some interesting, useful information for our campers who travel with their pets. Here's a synopsis of what was in the article. If you don't have a pet and want to get one, look at their personality and a better choice is a submissive one over a dominant one. Try holding the animal on its back and hold them there. If they give up fighting you within 15-20 seconds, they are probably a good Of course, they should be housebroken. And while most chew on everything in sight, they can be taught what's acceptable by encouraging items on which they *should* be chewing.

A quick review of the internet for other tips included:

- Get them used to a leash early. It shouldn't be a punishment. They should walk *with* you.
- Don't reward bad behavior. For example, barking is asking for attention. Don't yell, or even look at them. When they are finally quiet, even to just take a breath, reward them. But be consistent. Everyone in the household must help with training. As they catch on that quiet gets them a treat, lengthen the amount of time they must remain quiet to be rewarded. Keep your dog tired. Look for dog parks. Make sure they are getting sufficient mental and physical exercise every day. A

tired dog is a good dog and one who is less likely to bark from boredom or frustration. If this is unsuccessful, you may need a professional trainer.

- Make certain your pet has ID tags that are up to date. A microchip with current information improves your chances of getting your animal back should you be separated.
- While camping, your pet may be exposed to any number of other animals that can injure or expose them to disease so keep an eye on them; don't let them wander unattended and carry a health certificate.
- In your emergency information you should include your veterinarians contact information, a current color photo of your pet, an ID tag that includes owners name and cell number.
- A current copy of your pets' medical records including pre-existing conditions, proof of vaccinations, current medications and any allergies.

I'm sure there are many, many other tips and ideas for traveling with your pet.

I hope you find something that works for you and your furry family to make traveling enjoyable for you both.

10 THINGS WE WISH NEW RVERS KNEW AT THE CAMPGROUND



There are most definitely unspoken rules when it comes to RV campground etiquette. Are you guilty of these 10 mistakes RV newbies tend to make?

Every RVer starts out as a newbie and is bound to make a mistake or two. Luckily, there are millions of experienced RVers that can help you learn the ropes when it comes to RV campground etiquette.

My husband Will and I went straight into camping after leaving the dealership with our first RV. As newbie travelers, we had no idea what to expect—nor did we know that there are some definite taboos when staying at campgrounds. I quickly learned on this first

trip, and continued to learn over the next few years, that there are unwritten rules to follow when it comes to RV camping etiquette. From neighbors cutting through our campsite to late-night loud music, we've pretty much seen it all. Here are some things we learned that can help others prepare for camping life.

RV Campground Etiquette Tips

Don't Walk Through Campsites

It can be tempting to quickly cut through the "common grass" between sites to get to another site or to nearby amenities. While it may add a few extra minutes to your walk time, you should always walk on the road or public paths at the RV park to respect others' space.

Resist Blasting Your Music

It's easy to get carried away when you're having a good time camping, but if your music is too loud, it can be disturbing for your neighbors. Keep your music at a comfortable level so it can't be heard from your neighbor's campsite. If you're unsure, walk by neighboring sites and see if you can hear your music. Adjust your volume accordingly.

Adhere to Quiet Hours

Most RV parks, resorts, and campgrounds have quiet hours. You'll typically receive a pamphlet at check-in with rules of the park that includes this information. Quiet hours are a range of hours (for example 10 p.m. to 8 a.m.) when all guests can expect the noise level not to be at a daytime high. Many campers are inside their RVs or enjoying a quiet and relaxing time by the campfire, and you definitely want to avoid being reported to the office for noise during designated quiet hours.

Account for Your RV's Slide-Outs

If your rig has slide-outs, be sure to account for them when parking and setting up your campsite. There's nothing worse than the slides from the rig next to you encroaching on your site. We park our rig and test the slide-outs before unhooking. This saves time compared to having to hook everything back up and re-park. You can also check in advance what RV site may be the best for your rig if you have larger slides.

Ask for Permission with Pets

RVers love bringing their furry friends along. And while it's tempting to pet every dog you see at the campground, always ask the owner for permission first. Typically, pet owners—and their pets—are friendly, but it's the polite thing to do. Over the years, I've seen some owners who are sensitive to petting.

Let Your Neighbors Park and Get Settled First

Having new camp neighbors pull in is always exciting. RVers like to check out other rigs, see how people set up camp, and say hello—but keep in mind that the family is trying to focus on parking and setting up. Once they seem to be settled in, feel free to welcome them.

Don't Put Your Grill on the Picnic Table

It's tempting to take your portable grill and set it up on the campsite's picnic table, but think twice. Grills can leave stains, cause the table material to warp, and leave a residue. Instead, bring along an inexpensive portable table so you can leave the campsite clean for future campers.

Be Prepared Before Arriving at the Dump Station

Prior preparation is key to avoid holding up the line at the dump station. We make sure to have gloves and the black tank hose and connector piece handy by the time we pull up to the dump station

Park Your Tow Vehicle at Your Site

We have a 38-foot trailer and truck that we have to account for when booking a campsite. To the best of your ability, don't block the road and park at your site. Even if a site nearby is empty, never use it as your personal parking pad. If you need additional parking, there may be space near the clubhouse or registration area.

Don't Be Afraid to Ask for Help

RVers at the campground are typically friendly and willing to help when needed—it's all part of the RVing community and culture.

DIY PROJECT: UPGRADING RV POWER CONNECTION TO SMARTPLUG

The SmartPlug Combo Kit uses the existing RV power cord, saving a lot of money. The old plug end is cut off and the SmartPlug in-

The second step is faster than the first. It involves removing the inlet from the side of the RV and replacing it with the SmartPlug unit. 


